Key points noted:

Tree Wardens have a vital local and national role to play in taking records of existing hedges and trees (photo's and notes) so that change can be tracked over time. Indeed it was a Norfolk Tree Warden who first sounded the alarm on as die back. However feedback from the floor is that they need ongoing local and national support (training, information, networking and feedback on their input) and a clear steer.

- Tree wardens also have an important role in liaising with land owners, inspiring, planting and the on going management of trees and hedgerows in their local area. In Suffolk the Suffolk Hedgerow survey helps identify species which thrive in each patch. There is also National interest in planting species which produce a harvest (be that food, drink, fuel or material).
- Landowners need to think about connectivity in the Landscape to protect what we all love about Suffolk. Veteran Trees need to be part of a hedge or to have nectar bundles planted around them to support the beetles that live in them. Hedgerows need to be left wild and not flailed and boxed.
- National and international research into Chalara (ash die back) is ongoing. There may be some quickening of dieback if Ash is young, stressed, with branches below 7 foot and in an enclosed space (e.g. within hedged area at Pound Farm Wood). Management of it depends on the land owners use of the land and trees and varies between immediate removal of infected or at risk trees and replacement with an alternative such as Hornbeam to leaving nature to take its course. Landowners and Landscape Officers need to be aware of the risk to their tree stocks and decide on what their approach will be. Guy Ackers and the Suffolk Hedgerow Survey will provide a useful source of info on this. Note: the Survey does not include counts of trees (bar in some parishes) as it is a record of frequency to show species richness it does show Ash is of importance in some areas in particular and may therefore leave some gaps nature is not able to fill without help (occurring in between 26% and 46% depending on landscape type). Tree wardens can help the research by looking and recording photographing the Ash trees in their parish & send findings to the Ash tag project - details of which are on their web pages -- www.ashtag.org.
- Two key areas of law: Statute and Common law. The concept of ownership is key (he who has the roots..) and it is up to owners to manage their trees and hedges in accordance with the law and what their purpose is. Tree wardens can support, encourage and guide. Local Authorities will consider the importance of trees (and whether a Tree Preservation Order will be affected/is required) and hedgerows (if over 30 years old, at least 20 metres long and containing certain pant species) when planning permission is requested (challenge as most applications come in Winter when the species are not there, gaps have formed in hedge making it less that 20 meters, or coppicing means no old wood can be found). Note: The Forestry Commission deal with all countryside trees and enquiries should go to them in the first instance.
