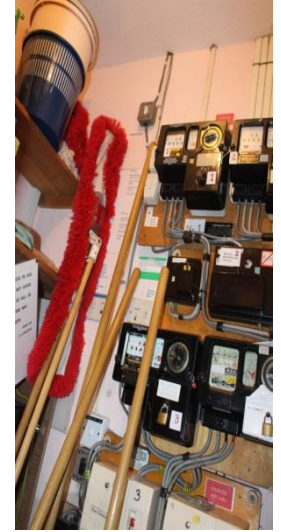




# Thriving Community Buildings

June 2013 – March 2018





11. The Committee shall provide and keep a minute book and books of account. Accounts shall be audited annually.

12. Within the limits herein prescribed the Committee may from time to time make or alter rules for the conduct of its business and for the auditing conduct and recording in a minute book of its meetings and in particular with reference to:-

(a) The terms and conditions upon which the Village Hall may be used by persons or bodies other than the Committee for entertainments meetings social gatherings and other purposes and the sum (if any) to be paid for such use. Notwithstanding such rules the Parish Council shall be entitled to use of the Village Hall free of charge.

(b) The deposit of money at a proper bank and the safe custody of documents

(c) The appointment of an auditor

(d) The engagement and dismissal of such officers servants and agents as the Committee may consider necessary and the payment of such persons (not being members of the Committee). All rules made or altered by the Committee shall follow as closely as possible the guidelines issued by Suffolk Coastal District Council and by the Village Halls Service of the National Council for Voluntary Organisations and shall be displayed together with a calendar of bookings for the Village Hall both inside and outside the hall at all times.

# Applying for funds

**Helping small to medium sized organisations understand the issues and act** – Develop understanding of the plastics manufacturing industry in East Suffolk and those making use of plastics and those handling them at the end of their life with the aim of establishing collaborations to design out waste and prevent escape into our valuable natural environment. This will be carried out in partnership with Suffolk Coast & Heaths AONB and independent place based organisations and groups.

**Plastic Action Champions** – Volunteer Champions identified and trained in key locations in East Suffolk and kits/art activities developed that they can use to go into schools, colleges, businesses and to take to public events to raise awareness. These volunteer champions will link to schemes that already exist and whose activities support a move from single use plastics. Funds will also be used to support those organisations where added value and joint working can be demonstrated.

**Informed art inspiring action**– A well informed communication and grant support project developed and run to encourage artists of all genres in East Suffolk to work with local groups, schools and colleges. The aim is to raise awareness of the effects of plastic being found on our streets, beaches and land and to make people think about maximising use of natural resources and best practice routes to follow and to look at the events they run or participate in to work out what plastic they use and what could be reduced or made best use of up. A digital gallery will be created. April 2018 - March 2020.

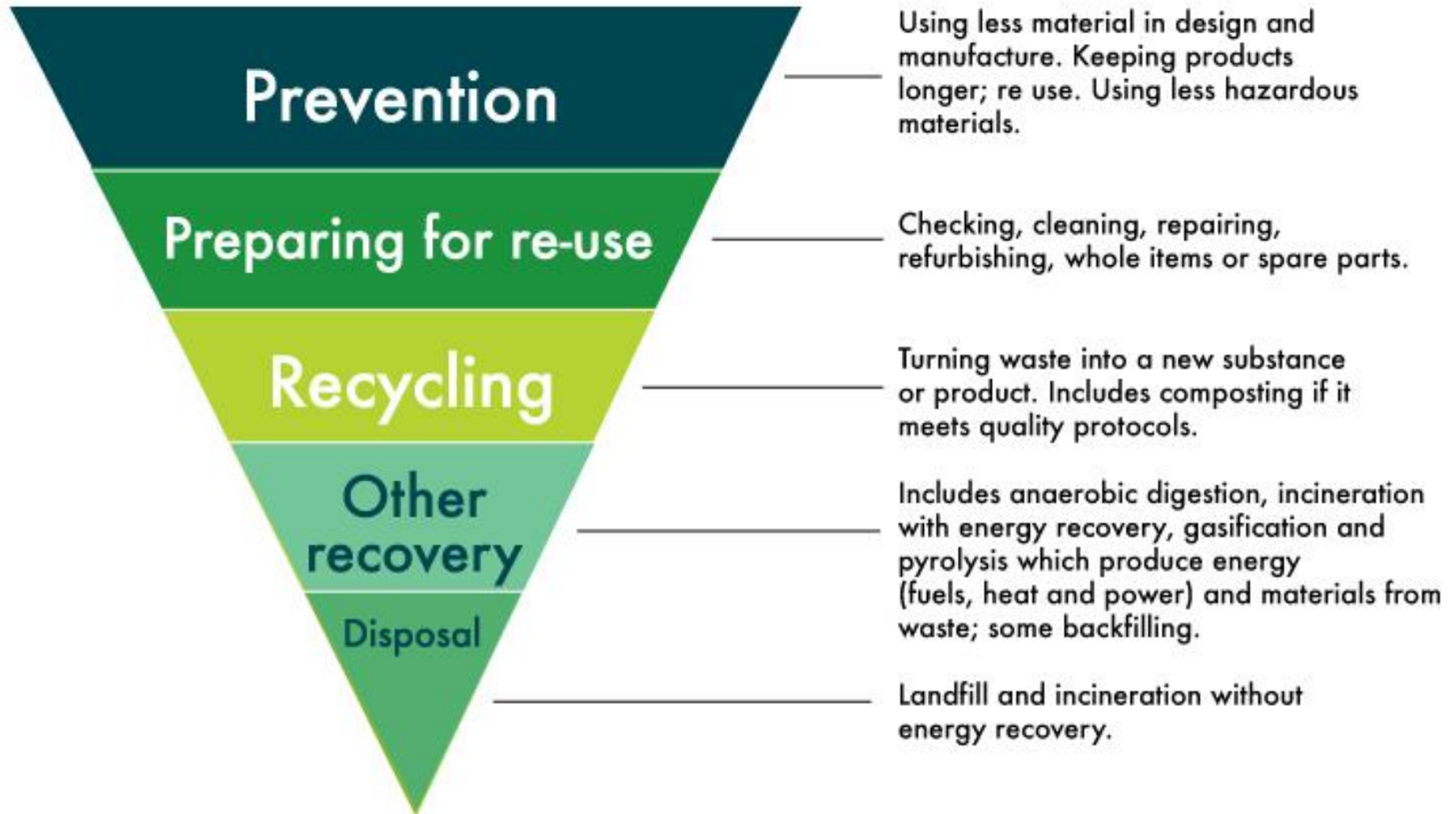












Thermoplastics can be remelted and remoulded almost indefinitely. These include drinks bottles, milk cartons, some toys.



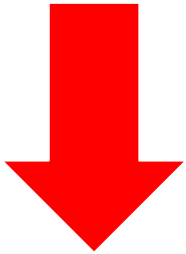
But thermosetting plastics cannot be reprocessed – they can only be heated and moulded once. They cannot be recycled.



These include Teflon, polyurethane foam, melamine, polyester, and electrical fittings











Using less material in design and Manufacture. Keeping products longer; re-use.  
Using less hazardous materials.  
Product redesign.

Checking, cleaning, repairing, refurbishing, whole items or spare parts.

Turning waste into a new substance or product. Includes composting if it meets quality protocols.

Includes anaerobic digestion, incineration with energy recovery, gasification and pyrolysis which produce energy (fuels, heat and power) and materials from waste; some backfilling.

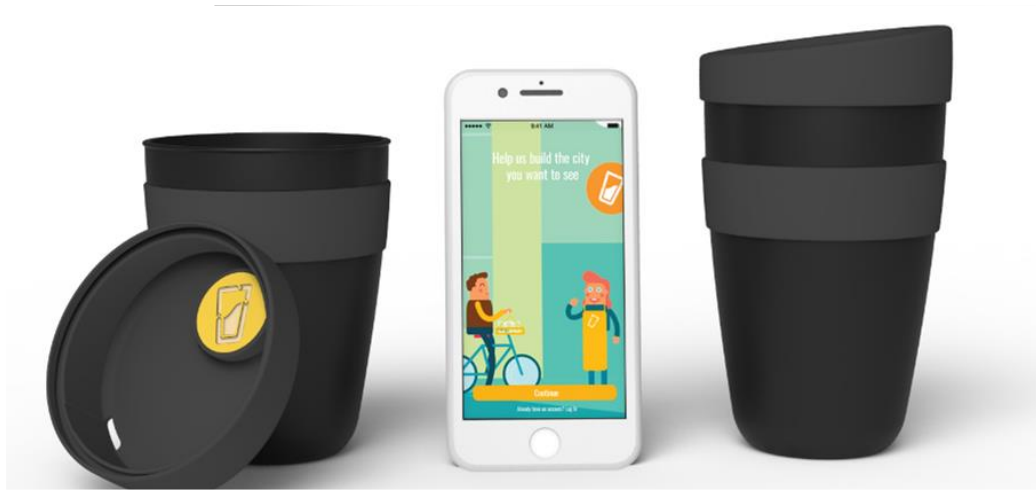
Landfill and incineration without energy recovery.

# How Suffolk Waste Partnership deals with household plastics in Suffolk



- Suffolk Waste Partnership has existed since late 1990s - 7 District and Borough Councils and the County Council
- Collect and separate recycling from all Suffolk households – *co-mingled* collection (paper, card, plastics, metals)
- Same range of materials collected in all areas of the county
- Other plastics accepted at Suffolk's 11 Household Waste Recycling Centres
- Collected & sorted approx. **11,300 tonnes** of plastics in 2017/18

- Accept most single-use household plastic packaging
- Bottles
- Food trays, tubs & pots (clear & coloured)
- All materials need to be empty, clean, dry & loose (not bagged)





## Plastic Bottles

- drink bottles
- cleaning products
- beauty products

## Single use Food packaging

- food trays (clear and coloured)
- pots (and lids)
- Tubs (and lids)

## Clean and Dry

- Remove food waste
- Leave to drain
- Squash if possible
- Please put lids back on bottles

# Materials Recycling Facility (MRF)

- Receives recycle from all over Suffolk – tonnage
  - approx. **18%** (of recycling bin),
  - approx. **9,500 tonnes p/yr**
- Materials sorted and separated by type - by a mix of **hand sorting** and mechanical
- Plastics are separated from other materials – sent to Rochester plant where ‘Optical Sorters’ separate into 7 different polymer types

## Plastics not accepted (but often put in) Suffolk kerbside recycling bins:

- Hard plastics from the home & garden
- Plastic toys
- Carrier bags and plastic film

- **11 Household Waste Recycling Centres across Suffolk**
- **Accept most single-use household plastic food packaging**
- **Accept rigid plastics from household and garden**
- **Accept plastic bags**
- **Processed 1,800 tonnes in 2017/18**

# MRF Code of Practice

- October 2014: Legislation to increase quality of recycling at MRF's
- 'In & Out' Samples are taken to ensure traceability of recyclate
- In cabin recycling is sorted into separate materials and weighed
- All findings are reported to SWP monthly so we can communicate to any area where recycling is contaminated
