Introducing Justin Hunt, New Head of Housing Services

In February, I had the pleasure of meeting Justin Hunt, the new Head of Housing Services. Forty three year old Justin lives in Kesgrave near Ipswich with his wife and three children. They have an impressive menagerie of pets, three cats, a hamster, two tortoises and some fish. He spent many childhood holidays at Sizewell with his parents, who live in Suffolk.



Although he's spent most of his working life so far in the London area, he considers himself a local having lived in Kesgrave for the last 1 I years. At the weekends Justin likes travelling the country attending karate tournaments with his family. He and his eldest son achieved black belt status last year and are now both instructors. He says karate helps him stay fit and run fast, which he believes is the best way to avoid trouble. Justin did a degree in housing at Bristol University and says he's never looked back, finding it rewarding to help many people who would otherwise find it hard to get themselves secure and decent homes.

Most recently Justin has been working for Camden Borough Council in Housing Management. During his career in London, he has had many different roles which have helped him get a good overview of the housing service and the way all the different departments fit together. He tells me he genuinely enjoys his work and that "The massive variety of challenges make every day interesting and rewarding". In his new role he'll be working very hard to maintain and improve the standard of housing at a time of ever increasing challenges. We have all heard the phrase 'Housing Crisis' frequently used in the media, little or no new stock being built and right to buy diminishing what little stock there is. This leaves young families whom seem well paid on £30,000 - £60,000 incomes unable to get a foot on the housing ladder. He will be working with a whole range of organisations to find new solutions, to help meet the demand for affordable homes. He's looking forward to working with his staff, council members and tenants to find ways to improve services and make cost efficiencies.



What? Rent going down?

Yes, hard to believe but it is true. The Government has made all Councils reduce the rent charged to tenants by 1%. You will have seen this from your rent notification in February. You may not know that the Government have actually said the 1% decrease must take place over the next four years. This means that your rent will continue to go down until 2020.

Now, this is great news for tenants. Especially those that do not receive any benefit towards their rent as it will mean more money in your pocket. However, it is fair to say that there is a flipside.

The Council have budgeted for the next 30 years on the income they expect to receive and the money they

expect to spend on our homes and the management of them. That plan will now need to be scaled back because instead of the Council expecting a 3% increase each year there will be a 1% reduction (meaning a 4% difference in effect each year). The knock-on effect is that investment will reduce and savings may have to be looked for to help manage the budget.



Helping to Reduce the Debt

A debt is a debt so they say, and debts should be paid. The Council has worked on that old adage for some years and it is pleasing to see that the level of rent debt for those former tenants has reduced substantially thanks to the good work of Dean Stirling our Former Tenant Arrears Officer.

The level of debt has fallen from £158,500 to \pounds 57,000 over a twelve month period (see graph). This good work has brought money back to the Housing Team to invest in our housing which benefits all the tenants. The council has just shown it's commitment to make sure past tenants pay their dues by making Dean's post permanent after a two year trial. Hopefully he can get the arrears even lower.

Hot To Go Vegetable Curry

1 Cauliflower, cut in large sprigs 6 Tomatoes, skinned and sliced 6-8 small potatoes, peeled and

quartered 1/4 lb. shelled peas 1/4 lb. french beans



1 level tbsp. turmeric, 1 ±/2 level tbsps. mild curry powder ±/2 level tsp salt 20z butter, 6 small onions skinned, 1 clove of garlic skinned and crushed, 1 ±/4 cups stock

Place the raw cauliflower, toms, pots, peas and beans on a large place or tray, mix spices and sprinkle over the veg.

Melt the butter in a heavy pan and fry the small onions and garlic, do not burn. Add the spiced veg then stock, bring to the boil and simmer for 20 mins till all veg are soft.

Serve with rice.



No Meat Stew

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Chop 2-3 med to large potatoes, 3-4 carrots and 1 large onion into very small pieces, add sweetcorn, cabbage and celery if you have it.

In a stew pot 1/2 fill with water and bring to the boil, add pre soaked pearl barley, add mixed herbs, Veg or meat stock cubes if you prefer, lid on and simmer till veg and barley are cooked.

*Left overnight it will thicken more, just add more water and heat.

#makeyourmoneygofurther

In partnership with Suffolk Coastal District Council and the Citizens Advice Bureau, Waveney is preparing for the introduction of Universal Credit with a campaign to help people make their money go further. Universal Credit is a new benefit that incorporates Jobseekers Allowance, Income Support, Employment and Support Allowance, Housing Benefit, Working Tax Credit and Child Tax Credit.

This new benefit was introduced at Lowestoft and Beccles Jobcentres in March 2015 and Waveney is helping with the transition to this new benefit. And to raise awareness of Universal Credit and making your money go further, Waveney District Council have teamed up with Lowestoft College to produce a series of videos as part of an online social media campaign to support new applicants.

Anyone who applies for Universal Credit can receive a financial advice session, providing applicants with hints tips and techniques to help stretch every last valuable penny.

To make the most of this new benefit, and accompanying financial advice, applicants are being encouraged to discuss making their money go further with their Work Coach.

GUNTON BAPTIST CHURCH

Our second visit to Gunton Baptist Church on the Gunton Estate covers one particular role in the community; it's a project which has created its own little niche, not just at Gunton, but in other communities in North Lowestoft – Dreamworx. Not the film company, but a part of Gunton Signpost that has been supporting young people since 2008. Originally concentrating on helping those on the estate itself, eight years on the Dreamworx project has expanded its drop-ins for children in years 5 to 9 to include facilities at Boston Lodge.

The services Dreamworx offer include team-building, new experiences, sport, making new friends, basic first aid, and food

hygiene certificates. Supporting the young people of Gunton, Dreamworx has also enabled the youngsters to improve their outlook on life, and to build up their confidence. Education is an important aspect, as is fun, and any training is given in an informal manner. At the end of the day, the young person comes away with a qualification as well as making new friends. The highpoint for Dreamworx and the Food Bank, as well as for the Estate, was the visit in October 2015 of HRH the Princess Royal.

Founded by the church's previous incumbent, the Rev Colin Napper, as part of his Signpost project, Dreamworx was run until recent years by

Garden Waste Bonfire Safety

If you're one of the many people who couldn't or wouldn't pay the council's unpopular £42 charge for the green bin, you may at some point need to have a bonfire. There are no housing regulations or by-laws that prevent you from doing so. All we ask is that you do it safely and with consideration for others. You can by rights have a fire at any time of day; I've always thought it fair to have one around tea time or early evening. This gives people the chance to enjoy their garden for the day and take in their laundry. It's polite to warn your neighbours and not have one more often than is necessary. Sit it well away from fences, greenhouses and your home. Don't be tempted to build one giant fire, have a small one and load it little and often. Please don't be tempted to burn household waste, especially plastics and painted objects, the smoke can be very toxic. Make sure the garden waste is dry as it will produce less smoke. It goes without saying that children and pets should be kept at a safe distance and supervised at all times. Have a bucket or two of water to hand in case things get out of control and never leave your bonfire unattended.

First Council House for a Generation!



Work is well underway on the first new council houses to be built in Bungay (and Waveney district too when you think about it) since the 1970's – Grandparents may remember council properties being built but anyone under 50 probably can't.

The Cabinet member for Housing Cllr Sue Allen cut the first sod last December on a site at Garden Close in the town, one of four former garage sites which are being redeveloped to provide 12 affordable homes.

The Bungay project is part of a wider council initiative to build over 100 new affordable homes across the district. Cllr Sue Allen commented: "There is a huge need for more affordable homes in towns like Bungay, and now that councils are allowed to build new council housing we are well placed to do this, given that we have a team in place which is already delivering high quality housing management services. These homes will be in addition to any new affordable homes which are being delivered by housing associations."

The 12 new homes are set to be completed in autumn 2016 with other developments in the pipeline too. There is no doubt that this is a new exciting era we are entering into with the Council confident it will deliver great new homes whilst still continuing to invest in our existing properties.

environmental grant budget Improve your Community

Have you ever thought if funding was available you could enhance the look or improve the quality of life in your neighbourhood or community you reside in? Well we might just have the solution.

Waveney District Council's Housing Tenancy Services have an annual budget of £30k to fund various projects and improvement schemes in your area.

How does it work?

The Environmental Grant applications are presented to a panel consisting of 6 elected tenants who decide if the grant application is successful or unsuccessful. If an application is submitted where a panel member resides that member will abstain from voting.

The Panel meet around four times a year depending on how many applications are submitted.

What projects have benefitted?

The projects and improvement applications we receive are quite diverse ranging from flower and shrub planting schemes to providing additional parking areas where emergency vehicles struggle for access, bus routes etc and providing / upgrading play equipment.

We have also part funded community projects on our estates and have provided additional lighting and remembrance gardens on our sheltered housing schemes.

How do I apply for a grant?

All you need to do is contact your Housing Officer who will not only advise you but assist you with the grant application, along with the support of other residents requesting the proposed grant application.





When do we know if our application is successful?

All applications are voted on and decided on the day. Provided the correct information is submitted with the application or no additional information is required by the panel, Charlotte, our Tenant Involvement Officer then contacts the applicant with the panel's decision.

Time Is Running Out For A Free, Impartial Home **Energy Assessment!**

A project that has helped over 300 people in Suffolk to review their energy use and potentially lower their bills is ending soon and looking to help more!

Suffolk Switched On, a project run by The Befriending Scheme and funded by Scottish Power Energy People Trust, has run since June 2015, in Haverhill, Ipswich, Lowestoft & Sudbury areas.

The programme is led by our trained volunteer mentors and offers a free home energy assessment, followed up with a recommendation report, giving impartial no cost – low cost advice on saving money and reducing energy usage. The report also contains a very useful "What to do now" section signposting consumers to organisations that could offer further help.

Our impartial service, made all the more important by recent controversies involving energy suppliers & charities, focuses on practical ways to reduce your energy bills. Help is available for those who are not familiar with how to switch

providers. No particular supplier or tariffs are recommended or endorsed by the scheme, allowing a free choice to be made by the household.

Time is running out to be a part of the scheme, although signing up is easy and there is no cost involved.



HEY! LOOK ETH I THINK HE'S BLOWN IT THIS TIME

Rhode Island Reds and Black Leghorns are extremely good egg layers and live very well together. Our chickens were vital to us as eggs were largely unobtainable in the shops, but they constituted a considerable slice of our meagre diet.

This was winter 1943. Winters were very real in those times, not the soggy wet mish -mash version we endure today. Britain was almost broke and near starvation. We discovered there is a limit to how many times bubble and squeak could be re-cycled.

Our chickens were often left to graze on the fields which distanced our bungalow from the William Girling Reservoir. A vital lump of London's water supply. This made them vulnerable to chicken rustlers who

George was our Rooster. He was a really large Rhode Island Cockerel resplendent in this red livery and iridescent blue –green tail feathers. He was magnificent and he knew it! His job was to look after the hens which he fulfilled to extreme, seeing off dogs, frightening the life out of cats and keeping the cows at a distance. He was an excellent flyer and often completed circuits over his flock seemingly for fun. He was afraid of nothing.

I was five years old when George decided I had strayed a little too

close and targeted me like a divebomber and latched on to my backside through my flimsy pants. I ran howling to the kitchen door with George firmly attached, using his enormous wing spread as an airbrake trying to stop me.

Later that same month George attacked my elder brother and made a mess of his face as he was tucking in the hens for the night. A decision was made he would have to go.

George disappeared that Christmas. Mum said he had gone to heaven to look after the angels chickens. Well they'd better look out I thought.

Christmas dinner was excellent that year!

Universal Credit - Full Service

From 25th May 2016 Lowestoft will become one of the first Jobcentre sites to be included in the Universal Credit full service roll out. This will mean anyone making a new claim for one of the six benefits that will become Universal Credit, will instead receive Universal Credit. These six benefits are Housing Benefit, Income Support, Employment and Support Allowance, Jobseekers Allowance, Working Tax Credits and Child Tax Credits. Universal Credit is paid as a single monthly payment incorporating all elements of your award, including your Housing costs. Anyone applying for Universal Credit is entitled to a free financial session to help prepare for the new monthly payment, make the most of all this can offer you by speaking to your work coach or contact Citizens Advice 01502 518510. The application for Universal Credit needs to be made online, if you need help making your application, or just need online access to enable you to apply, please visit the Marina Customer Service Centre or Beccles Library. Recycling & Sustainability

Waveney's Housing Maintenance Team are joining forces with Crown Paints and Brewers to provide a bespoke paint amnesty for a 2 week period commencing the 16th May to 27th May 2016.

This offer will be purely for all our tenants who have old paint to dispose of, as recycle/refuge sites will not accept any part filled paint containers, and hopefully prevent unnecessary recharges when the property becomes empty or disposal cost to the Authority from fly tipping.

The paint amnesty will cover all brands of oil based products, water based emulsions, acrylics and stain preservatives, and not just Crown products.

All products collected will be transferred to Crown paints Nimtech recycling plant that was set up employing people with learning disabilities and long term unemployed.

This is a very generous offer by both Crown and Brewers and we are very keen not only to take part, but promote this as we have never been offered this opportunity before by any other companies.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

Crown will supply Brewers with storage crates at their branch in Whapload Road Lowestoft.



Tenants will take their unwanted paint to Brewers who will not only dispose of it but will give a free roller pack on receipt and a ± 10.00 off paint voucher when spending ± 40.00 or more on crown trade products for people who wish to purchase more paint. Although this branch is sited in Lowestoft this offer is open to all our tenants in Waveney.



Because this offer is exclusive to our tenants proof will be needed via your tenancy agreement!

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE RECYCLED PAINT AND CANS?

On the delivery of the waste paint, Nimtech will recycle the products and on completion the paint is reused in third world countries on projects like schools, hospitals and agricultural equipment. All the plastic paint cans get recycled and re-used for things like garden furniture fencing etc. It takes 400 plastic paint cans to produce a garden bench!.

DID YOU KNOW

Hempel, the owners of Crown Paints, set up the Hempel Foundation supporting cultural, humanitarian and scientific charities around the world in conjunction with Save the Children.

The Hempel Foundation is currently working with 22 education projects across 16 countries to enable over 40,000 underprivileged children to receive a better education.

The projects are divided into 4 areas: improving local schools, helping child labourers to leave work and pursue an education, building new schools and after school education clubs.

Staff from Hempel volunteer a week's holiday to visit the countries and assist with the projects. Some of the countries which have already benefitted from the foundation are Cambodia, Mozambique, Bolivia, Indonesia and this year Vietnam.


Satisfaction Survey March 2015 to March 2016


