

Privacy Notice – Economic Development and Regeneration

Introduction	East Suffolk Economic Development and Regeneration Team have provided this privacy notice to help you understand how we collect, use, and protect your information whilst we provide you with Economic Development, Regeneration, and Funding. The document below will describe how we may collect and process your personal information. The purpose of this document is to clearly acknowledge the Council's responsibilities in relation to the UK General Data Protection Regulation (UK GDPR) and the Data Protection Act 2018.
Definitions	 Personal Data means any information related to an identified or identifiable natural (living) person ('data subject') i.e. a person that can be directly or indirectly identified by reference to a name, ID reference number, email address, location data, or physical, physiological, genetic, mental, economic, cultural or societal identifier Special Personal Data previously known as 'sensitive personal data', relates to race, ethnic origin, politics, religion, trade union membership, genetic data, biometric data, health, sex life or sexual orientation. Records of criminal personal data must also be treated in a similar way. Data Controller determines the purposes and means of processing personal data. Data Processor is responsible for any operation which is performed on personal data on behalf of the controller e.g. collection, recording, organisation, structuring, storage, adaption or alteration, retrieval, consultation, use, disclosure by transmission, dissemination or making available, alignment or combination, restriction, erasure or destruction.
	Third Party is someone / somebody who is not the Data Controller, the Data Processor or the Data Subject.

How do we use your information?

We will be using your information to:

- Contact you, following your enquiry, reply to any questions, suggestions, issues, or complaints you have contacted us about
- Process grant applications (which may include needing to share information with funders who are delivering grants with East Suffolk Council such as Government (Department for Leveling Up, Housing and Communities), Suffolk County Council and Arts Council England, our consultants, and New Anglia Local Enterprise Partnership (NALEP)/Creative:Unlimited representatives)
- Inform consultations and update you of developments relating to these consultations
- Research and monitoring projects measuring business and tourism impacts in connection with Sizewell C development in accordance with the Council's statutory funding requirements under the Planning Act 2008
- Process event applications which allows the facilitation of events on East Suffolk Council's land
- Process applications and registration on a consensual basis for training events
- Contact you regarding volunteering and Economic Development initiatives that you consensually signed up for
- Evaluate the success of the projects that are run by the Economic Development and Regeneration Team
- Monitor and provide reports to Government on all individuals and organisations that benefit from grants awarded as part of the UK Shared Prosperity Fund
- Monitor and provide reports to Government on all individuals and organisations that benefit from grants awarded as part of the Rural England Prosperity Fund
- Send information to you that we believe will be in your interest
- Create a user account for free public Wi-Fi services, further information can be found in the Wi-Fi <u>End User License Agreement (EULA)</u> and <u>Privacy</u> <u>Statement</u>
- Update our Cultural Sector newsletter and other mailing lists. Our email service provider captures the IP address of all emails sent. The Council uses this information to ascertain whether an email was bounced, received, or opened.
- Contact you via email about events and offers only if you consent to receive them when signing up to the free public Wi-Fi
- Produce anonymised statistics about the usage of the free public Wi-Fi service
- To collect anonymised data on footfall in our towns so that statistical analysis and reporting can be produced to enable us to understand town usage and inform town recovery strategies.

We will not use your personal data for other purposes other than for what it was collated unless we have obtained your consent or for other lawful purposes (e.g. detection and prevention of fraud).

We do not use systems to make automated decisions about you.

How long do we keep your information?	 We will hold your personal information in line with the Council's policies: Financial Data – 6 years plus current or longer if required by grant / financial regulation (when providing financial data you will be informed if your data is to be held longer than the time stipulated above). Personal Data – 3 years plus current for inactive data or longer if required by contractual or legislative regulations (when providing your personal data you will be informed if your data is to be held longer than the time stipulated above). Personal Data in relation to the UK Shared Prosperity Fund projects – 10 years as per the requirement set by HM Government. Personal Data in relation to projects and grant funding required under the Sizewell C Deed of Obligation – 14 years as per the requirement set by HM Government. Personal Data in relation to the Cultural Sector Newsletter and other mailing lists are retained until you request removal from future updates. After the specified data retention policies expire, we will delete your personal data. If we need to hold your data after this period of time, we will ensure that we have a lawful reason to hold this.
