About the fund

UK Shared Prosperity Fund

In April 2022, the then Government launched the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF). The primary goal of the UKSPF is to build pride in place and increase life chances across the UK. The Field to Fork programme is being partly funded by money from the UKSPF.

Field to Fork Grant Scheme

The UKSPF includes several investment priorities, one being 'Communities and Place', which aims to encourage projects that strengthen our social fabric and foster a sense of local pride. The current cost of living crisis has the potential to weaken communities and so East Suffolk Council, using UKSPF and other funding, is investing in a range of projects through its Ease the Squeeze programme to meet the needs of residents hit by the cost of living crisis. One of those projects is Field to Fork.

Field to Fork is part of the East Suffolk Council Ease the Squeeze cost of living programme and is partly funded by the UK Shared Prosperity Fund. The basic principle is that local people will be enabled to grow produce locally, gaining skills, increasing social interaction and providing cheap, nutritious food to offset the rising cost of living.

This will partly be delivered by offering grants for organisations to provide and farm small parcels of land, engaging local volunteers from the community to help. The produce grown in the communal gardens will be made available to volunteers on the projects, to community pantries and foodbanks and also, potentially, will be sold to generate income to expand the project.

Priorities of the grant scheme

The following three priorities have been identified by East Suffolk Council and all applicants must ensure that their application provides evidence how it meets as many of the priorities as possible:

1. To increase the number of people engaging with new or existing local allotments, community gardens, green spaces or equivalents that offer the ability to grow produce.
2. Increase the amount of locally grown food within the East Suffolk food system by producing it in your growing space and distributing it
3. Broaden peoples understanding of how to use fresh produce in their day-to-day cooking.

The type of things that can be funded include, but are not limited to:



- Establishing a new growing space
- Events that increase engagement with your allotment, garden, space, etc.
- Tools or equipment that increase capacity.
- Storage or enclosed spaces that can increase the number of people able to participate in activities.
- Cooking lessons/clubs that enable people to use healthy, local produce from your growing space

Grants of up to £2,000 per application. You don't have to have partnership/match funding for your project, however if you do, your application may be assessed more favourably (this could be cash and non-cash/volunteer contributions).

Types of project

This fund can only support a Field to Fork project and not any other kind of project. Sites may differ in description – for example an allotment, community garden, growing space, etc.

Who can apply?

The fund is available to independent, place-based groups who are located within the geographical area of East Suffolk.

This includes:

- Any constituted “not for profit” community, voluntary or business group
- Voluntary organisations or social enterprises
- Towns and Parish Councils
- Schools in East Suffolk
- Housing Associations

Individual profit-making businesses will not be eligible to apply, however, businesses are encouraged to work with respective town/parish councils and/or business groups – and if businesses are able to offer additional support that would be great.

What we cannot fund

- Applications from individuals – we cannot make grant payments to individuals
- VAT: If you are able to claim back VAT then VAT is not eligible as part of the costs of your project and should not be included.
- Staffing costs
- Projects that do not provide a clear timeline for delivery
- Activities promoting political or religious beliefs
- Payments towards endowment funds, deficit funding or loans



- Repeat funding – i.e. if East Suffolk Council has previously provided a grant for the same activity
- Items or projects which only benefit an individual
- Retrospective costs
- Projects that will displace existing provision
- Activities that are statutory obligations

Monitoring and evaluation

To help us assess the effectiveness of the Field to Fork programme, we require you to provide some data back to us. This includes:

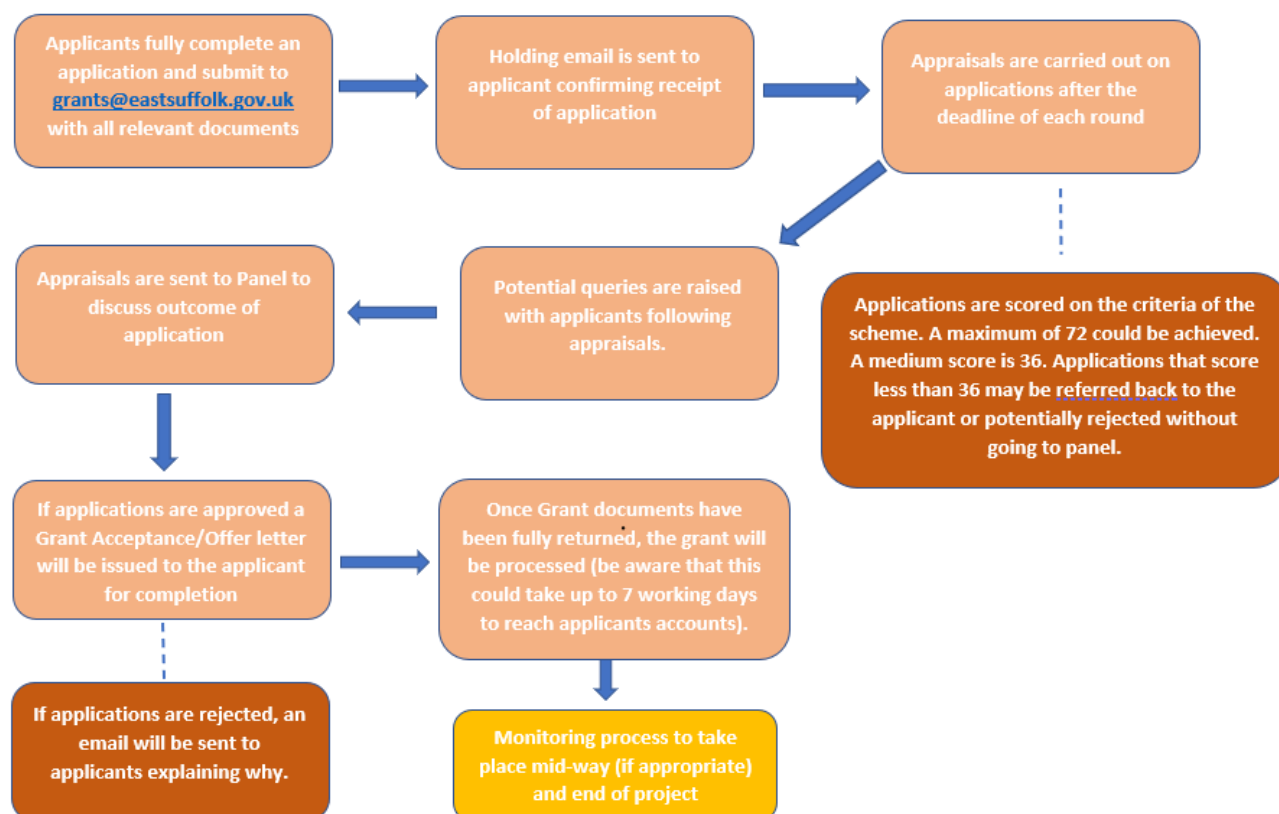
- Sending updates on your project at 3 and 6 month periods post-grant acceptance, including
 - Number of people regularly using the asset before and after the scheme launch
 - Practical impact the grant funding has had on your asset
- Administer a short survey (that we will provide) to people that engage in order to understand the personal impact the grant funding and your asset is having.
- Provide photographic evidence of use of the grant funding.
- Explaining the distribution of excess produce from your asset. These answers will differ from asset to asset so there is no right or wrong answer, however it helps us understand the situation at a District level.

How to apply

If you would like to access funding through the East Suffolk Field to Fork Grant, please complete the application form. Once completed and signed (an electronic signature is fine), please send your completed application to: grants@eastsuffolk.gov.uk

Process

If the application is fully complete (i.e. all the required information is provided) it will be considered by a Panel which will be as soon as possible after the grant deadline below. See the diagram below for more information on the application process.

These dates set out above are subject to change if a high number of applications is received.

If your application is successful, you will be notified of the decision through a Grant Acceptance (via email) within 5 working days of the Panel.

Funds through this grant scheme **should only be spent on the items/purpose detailed in the application form and Grant Acceptance** and within the timescales set out in your application.

You must indicate on your form if you have applied for or intend to apply for match funding for this project. If the grant is not spent on the approved purposes or there is an underspend, the Council has the authority to reclaim part or all of the grant. If you are proposing to make any changes to your approved project, please inform us as soon as possible.

An evaluation and monitoring form will be sent for completion **after 6 months** to ascertain the impact that the project / activity had. Returning this form to us is one of the grant conditions.

Please keep copies of receipts and invoices related to the project / activity – we may ask to see these as part of our monitoring process as we spot check a proportion of successful applications.

Applications will be scored as per the scoring matrix below to ensure a fair and competitive process.
