The Challenges

- Fuel poverty
- Poor energy efficiency of homes
- Cold and damp homes
- Enforced use of pre-payment meters
- Risk to safe sleeping for infants
- Heat the person not the home v damp and mouldy homes
- Increased heart and lung conditions
- Respiratory illnesses
- Increased winter admissions, potentially winter deaths

Housing

The Challenges

- Housing is not affordable to buy or rent
- Lack of rental housing
- Housing insecurity
- Non-payment of rent/mortgage
- Overcrowding
- Homes in disrepair
- Increased evictions/homelessness
- Risk of domestic abuse
- Barriers to education and work

WINTER WARMTH

Are you working with a resident or patient who is struggling to afford to heat their home?

Do you support families who sleep in one room as they don't have enough bedding to go round?

Would some simple items of clothing, bedding or draughtproofing make a difference?

SUFFOLK WINTER WARMTH PACKS ARE NOW AVAILABLE

The referral process is really simple! Using our standard form please:

- Record your details.
- Record the client's details (so we can get their consent to the information being shared with us and contact them to arrange delivery).
- Either select a standard winter warmth pack on the form (option A) or create a bespoke warmth pack by adding items (option B)
- If you cannot access the webform we can supply in alternative format to then email to winterwarmtheeastsuffolk.gov.uk requesting a copy.



CAN YOU PROVIDE A VITAL WARM ROOM FOR YOUR COMMUNITY THIS WINTER?

community will struggle to heat their home in the Winter months. That will leave them at risk of poor physical health, due to the cold, and struggling with their mental health due to social isolation.

So East Suffolk Council is co-ordinating a network of Warm Rooms across the District to give people somewhere to come to stay warm, connected and healthy.

HOW IT WORKS

We need safe, inviting spaces that are heated for 6 hours a day, 2 days a week, for 22 weeks over Winter

You can donate your Warm Room or we can contribute towards your heating and lighting costs and pay for hot drinks for your guests.

Your guests will be able to keep warm, socialise and access additional support from other providers where appropriate.

You'll make an enormous difference to people's lives at this difficult time.

Community Needs?

- Bungay is lacking in Community Resources by comparison with other market towns in our patch
- Bungay Town Council emergency support initiative during the pandemic (BECS) revealed hidden needs related to isolation and loneliness exacerbated, but not caused by lockdown
- Community nursing staff attached to GP surgery recognise that often the non-medical needs of vulnerable patients extend beyond what they can provide
- Data sources have identified significant demographics of unmet needs, and areas of deprivation:

Bungay Housing Needs Assessment (AECOM for Bungay Neighbourhood Plan); Suffolk Observatory; Beccles, Bungay & Halesworth Community Partnership Profile 2022; Cost of Living Crisis 2022, ESC Councillor Briefing

• There is little indication that the current CoLC is likely to be resolved any time soon



BCS Current Provision



- A shopping and meds service
- A befriending scheme
- The Baby Basics service provides new and pre-loved baby and toddler clothing and equipment, also nappies and babycare products
- We are an umbrella organisation for smaller community groups e.g., Meet Up Mondays
- Workshop provision e.g., Crafty Corner at No.8 Marketplace
- Seasonal projects e.g., Walk & Talk, Warm Rooms
- Emergency response e.g., support for residents during 2020 floods
- Signposting and referral to specialist services e.g., Citizens Advice, LWAS (Local Welfare Association Scheme), Foodbank etc.
- Local distributor of aid e.g., Warm Packs, Supermarket Vouchers (Coop and Morrisons), Comfort Food Vouchers (ESC)



- 2020 March Creation of BECS (Bungay Emergency Community Support) to provide essential provisions to vulnerable residents during lockdown
- 2021 Spring Received recognition for Outstanding Service to the Community of Suffolk during the COVID-19 Pandemic from the Lord Lieutenant for Suffolk
- 2021 November Pioneered the Warm Rooms concept and first to deliver this type of provision. Articles in national and international press and local radio and TV
- 2022 January Received British Empire Medal in New Year Honours List for Services to the Community in Bungay During the COVID-19 Pandemic
- 2022 August BCS achieved charitable status
- 2022 October received The New Community Group Award from Bungay Town Council
- 2023 Have an active volunteer register of 65+/-
- 2023 To date BCS have been successful in receiving financial support from 16 organisations



Current & Future Plans

Maintain a flexible structure that can work with other agencies in response to identified social needs whether endemic or a crisis We are in the process of converting an old butcher's shop opposite Bungay Primary School into a permanent community hub and accompanying Foodhall/community pantry. Due to open later this month

Employing 2 part-time members of staff: Volunteer Co-ordinator and Foodhall Supervisor

Liaising closely with Head of Primary school to identify support for families e.g., parent workshops Premises to be used as base for outreach services e.g., Citizens Advice, Job Club, and self help support groups e.g., LEAF

Provide a 'one stop shop' for signposting and referrals



• Funding:

Lack of core funding means reliance on maintaining a continuous stream of small grants. This is a disadvantage to any long term/sustainable business planning. Unless this can be addressed it makes grass roots voluntary sector organisations insecure partners to participate in any multi agency planning e.g., INTs (Integrated Neighbourhood Teams)

• Reaching the hard to reach:

Whilst data exists within statutory organisations e.g., DWP, social services, general practice there is a need to devise mechanisms that, whilst respecting the principles of GDPR, enable better data sharing between statutory and voluntary sector, and between VCSE organisations to enable more effective targeted support.

• Development and maintenance of internet and social media presence:


Essential to the effective functioning of community providers but requires expertise beyond the scope of trustees and the remit of volunteers but costly to buy in.
