Key messages to share with your community

- We have a fabulous diverse natural heritage which includes: wet meadows, marsh, heaths, mature woodland, shingle beaches, open grassland and hedgerows. This supports wonderful, diverse, eye catching species such as the iconic Avocet, Short Eared Owls, Bearded Tits, Brimstone Butterflies, Gaekeeper's, Marsh Harriers, Bittern, Hobby, Water Vole, Chinese Water Deer, Sheep's sorrel and Yellow-Horned poppy.
- Besides being important in its own right wildlife and the habitats it thrives in are increasingly being recognised as vital for:
 - > Food production (e.g. pollinators, soil and water quality).
 - Climate adaptation (e.g. reducing flooding of property)
 - Our mental and physical health and well being.
 - Our economy (£1.75billion a year into Suffolk County's economy. Suffolk's two Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) alone accounted for £260million a year, £200m of which was generated in the Suffolk Coast and Heaths AONB).
 - > Inspiring creative endeavours, sculpture, painting, architecture
- The key challenges to our wildlife and the habitats it thrives on are:
 - Shifting baseline syndrome: biodiversity losses become generationally accepted as biodiversity's annually reducing baseline becomes the norm
 - Viewing efforts to protect nature and wildlife as barriers to growth rather than recognising the value of that nature and wildlife as part of our prosperity which growth needs to accommodate.

- > Increasing demands on resources (e.g. water, land)
- Increasing coastal erosion and flood risk
- Increasing severity of non coastal floods
- Felixstowe is a key location for migrating birds, wall lizards and rare plants such as the Sea Kale and Yellow Horned Poppy.
