Collaborating with young people on environment and climate change challenges

3 March 2023

An interactive session co-produced by the East Suffolk Greenprint Forum and students from Benjamin Britten High School (Lowestoft) and Sir John Leman High School (Beccles), and enabled by East Suffolk Council's Communities Team.

It was held as part of the Community Partnerships Annual Forum on 3 March 2023 at Trinity Park, the overall theme of which was "Bringing Ideas to Life".

This session was a follow up to Youth Takeover Action Day held online in November 2022, in which students from eight schools and colleges in East Suffolk articulated in that peer-to-peer setting their vision for a positive environment to help share ideas between schools. We know that young people from East Suffolk are concerned about our environment.



At this workshop, students reiterated some of the ideas that had been put forward during Youth Takeover Day (see the presentation that the students delivered during this workshop for a summary of the ideas that they shared: PowerPoint Presentation (eastsuffolk.gov.uk)). So the 'what?' and 'why?' have been provided by the young people but what about the 'how'?





In keeping with the wider theme of the Annual Forum of which this workshop was a part, the students then discussed directly with delegates how we might work together with young people to deliver innovative community solutions to pressing issues like this and continue the conversation.

East Suffolk Councillors Mark Jepson and Letitia Smith were also in attendance.







Key points from the discussion, facilitated by Emily Knock (volunteer member of the Greenprint Forum Steering Group) were as follows:

- The 'Green Day' idea in schools was popular as a way to try and educate and engage around the environment in schools
- Split bins was also something that was popular and there could be partnership working with Norse around this
- A lot of discussion about how free things could be donated to help young people with their projects
- Communication techniques to continue the conversation included social media, eyecatching posters and forums to discuss issues and ideas and provide updates

Pledges made by delegates were as follows:

- ESC to continue to connect people, for example through the Greenprint Forum, the voluntary network of people and organisations committed or aspiring to environmental action in the community in east Suffolk
- ESC create more forums / comms lines to keep the conversation and ideas going!
- ESC to take feedback from the workshop to the Greenprint Forum Steering Group, to scope out a potential environmental project for schools and parish councils, including aspects around organic sustainable gardening and growing (a la "Field to Fork") and composting
- Probation Service can offer free labour to help with tree planting, preparing areas for planting, building bins, and potentially more;
- CAS work with Mens Shed to create bird boxes for schools, using reclaimed/free materials
- Beccles Town Council to enable the conversation between young people and Town Councillors to promote these issues
- Bungay Town Council to develop a green day with Bungay schools & the local Community Partnership

- Collect litter on the beach if budget permits, do a voucher scheme to give participants a free coffee or ice cream in return




