Don't pay for debt advice and help when you can get it for free

As a Rent Arrears Officer, I am coming across an increasing number of people who are paying a company to help them manage their debts. These costs range from £40 to £180 per month and this money could be used to reduce and clear arrears. When you pay a company to help you with your debts, a large amount of this money is going to the company and not towards what you owe your creditors.

Your Rent Arrears Officer can assist you with getting help with your debts at no cost to you, and help you stay in your home. The Housing team work closely with the Citizens Advice Bureau and Flagship Housing Support Team, and can refer you to the relevant agency to get you the

advice that you need.

This can be short term support to help you get back on track or long term if you feel you need more intensive assistance. Tenants often feel this reduces the stress of juggling their money and knowing who to pay when they cannot afford to pay everyone.

It is never too late to ask for help if you need it. Your Rent Arrears Officer can make an appointment to discuss your arrears at your home and then refer you for help to the most suitable agencies. So don't waste your precious money on these agencies when we can make sure you get it for free.

They can deal with all your housing enquiries, rent, benefits, repairs, neighbour disputes, exchanges and many other issues.

The trouble is not many people go there with housing problems which is a pity as this is a very useful source of information and guidance.

DHP... What is it?

Need extra help with your rent?

If you are receiving Housing Benefit, and this doesn't cover your full rent, you can ask Waveney District Council for extra help. They can help with an extra payment called "Discretionary Housing Payments (DHP)". This payment can top up your Housing Benefit to cover your full rent. To be eligible for this payment you need to be in financial hardship, usually this means you spend more a week than you have coming in. To apply you need to complete and return a full application form which is available online at www.waveney.gov.uk.

Thinking of moving to smaller or cheaper accommodation?

If you are moving home because

your current property is larger than you require and your Housing Benefit is reduced because of this, Waveney District Council can help you pay for your removal costs. They can help with the cost of removals by awarding a 'DHP'. To be eligible for this you need to be in a position where you cannot afford to pay for the cost of removals yourself.

If you are thinking of moving into a private rented property because your Housing Benefit is restricted at your current property due to having a spare room, Waveney District Council can help again with the cost of your rent deposit and rent in advance if you can not afford these. Our Housing Team though would advise you strongly to think before giving up a Secure Tenancy – please speak to your Housing Officer before making a decision. There are certain

conditions that must be satisfied to be eligible and the rent must be within the Local Housing Allowance rates. Information regarding Local Housing Allowance can be found on Waveney District Council's website www.waveney.gov.uk.

Are you receiving Housing Benefit and starting work?

If you have found work and you are worried about making up the shortfall in your rent whilst waiting for your first pay, Waveney District Council can help by awarding a 'DHP'. To be eligible you must be in receipt of at least 50p Housing Benefit per week once you have started work. Waveney have launched a new short form to help you apply for this assistance, the short form is available online at www.waveney.gov.uk.

Chasing the Debt

We have raised before in this magazine that tenants of the Council do sometimes quit their home leaving debts. Did you know for instance that at the end of last year we were owed £228,000! This is of course money that should be invested in our housing and improving where we live and so it really does impact on all of us.

The Housing Team have been aware of this issue for a while and a part-time Former Tenant Debt officer is now employed to start recovering money due to us. Dean Stirling has been doing the job since April and already we have reduced this debt by £50,000.

There is a lot more to do, but I think one of the messages we need to send is that if you are quitting your home please make sure your rent is paid right up to the date the keys are handed back to the Council. They will be following up to get the money back, which could include costs being imposed on you.

Tenancy Fraud

Tenancy Fraud is where someone who should be living in a flat or house isn't because they are using it to get benefit or are renting it out to others at a higher rent and making money for themselves. We do not know how much of this goes on in Waveney but we are on the case. The Housing Team are co-funding with other councils a special team to help catch those people who are defrauding the Council.

David Howson in the Housing department told us "we need to do this, not because we know that there is a lot of fraud going on but because even one case is depriving someone of a home and may be costing the taxpayer a lot of money".

The Council needs to know if you suspect that either someone is not living in the property and using it just to collect post etc. or if you think the original tenant has gone and they have sublet to someone else, which is not allowed under the tenancy agreement.

Tenant Scrutiny Panel update

Waveney Tenants Scrutiny Panel has finally come to the end of its first investigative project – the sorting out of the Housing Department's Voids – that is the time it takes for when a council house or flat becomes vacant to when a new tenant moves in.

It has been a hard journey, but a fruitful one. The panel of nine tenant volunteers went through extensive training and along the way we had considered a number of possible projects to begin with. Voids seem to be something we could get our teeth into, and so the Panel decided to jump into the deep end and start at that point.

Because Tenant Scrutiny Panels have governmental support – they were set up to challenge the Housing Service – the training was extensive. This also meant travelling as far afield as Nottingham as well as making contact with other Tenant Scrutiny Panels as far away as Welwyn and Hatfield and other local authorities and housing associations.

So . . . Voids? We're all guilty of it – a slight damage to a door here, the odd repair that we never got round to reporting to the Council there – when you move eventually it adds up and takes time to repair and make new. However, there are also those who do a moonlight flit, taking all including electrical fittings et al!




Eventually, the Scrutiny Panel presented three recommendations to Hobbits – not the Lord of the Rings kind but HoBTS – the Housing Benefit and Tenant Services Consultation Group – at the Town Hall Chamber on Monday 21 July, and these were:

1. That the Council employ a specialised person to deal with recharges for damage and clearances. Little evidence had been seen of any recovery action taking place at present, and this recommendation would ensure that those leaving a property would be aware they were held accountable for the state of the property they were leaving.
2. Some sort of incentive for tenants to leave properties in a good state of repair should be considered. This might include financial incentive to assist a tenant in their removals – provided, of course, that the property was left in an acceptable state of repair.
3. Unannounced inspections be carried out by Housing Officers from the service of the notice by the outgoing tenant up to the date of moving out where possible.

So what's next? The Scrutiny Panel's spotlight now turns onto Waveney Norse, and in particular its Parks and Gardens service. And this is where You come in. What has been your experience – good or bad – with Waveney Norse? What about the grass cutting? Or anything that Waveney Norse is involved in?



How Satisfied were you with the service provided by the Housing Team?




How Satisfied were you with the quality of your home?
