



Housing Advice Sheet 3: Housing Advice about evictions and the ending of a tenancy

This advice sheet about the ending of, or eviction from, different types of tenancies, such as social housing tenancies and assured shorthold tenancies.

Important changes to the homeless legislation

If the landlord has given you a valid notice, the council is now able to accept that you are threatened with homelessness within 56 days. The objective of intervening earlier is that we can work with you to either help you stay in the property or assist with securing alternative accommodation. The earlier that you make contact with East Suffolk Council, the better. The Housing Needs Team will be able to work with you on the underlying reasons as to why the landlord has served notice. This will mean liaising with the landlord, Revenues and Benefits and other related services to resolve your housing problem.

What type of tenancy do I have?

Most people have an assured shorthold tenancy, if you are unsure what type of tenancy you have, then this tool on the Shelter website is very useful to help you find out:
