Suffolk Coastal District Neighbourhood Plan Areas

Thank you for your consultation on the above dated 08/05/2013

Natural England is a non-departmental public body. Our statutory purpose is to ensure that the natural environment is conserved, enhanced, and managed for the benefit of present and future generations, thereby contributing to sustainable development.

Natural England is a statutory consultee in neighbourhood planning and must be consulted on draft neighbourhood development plans by the Parish/Town Councils or Neighbourhood Forums where they consider our interests would be affected by the proposals made. Natural England does not have the resources to get involved in all neighbourhood plans and will prioritise our detailed engagement to those plans that may impact on internationally or nationally designated nature conservation sites, and/or require Strategic Environmental Assessment or screening for Habitats Regulations Assessment.

1. Leiston

International and European Designated Sites

The following International and European sites fall within the Parish boundaries: Sandlings Special Protection Area (SPA); Minsmere to Warbleswick SPA; Minsmere to Warbleswick Heaths and Marshes Special Area of Conservation (SAC) and the Minsmere-Warbleswick Ramsar. If these designated sites are likely be affected by any proposals set out in the Neighbourhood Plan, for example by additional built development or by increased recreation pressure, a Screening Assessment may need to be carried out under the Habitat Regulations. This HRA Screening can draw upon the Appropriate Assessment of the Core Strategy and Development Management Policies, which we have found to be satisfactory.

Nationally Designated Sites

The following Sites of Special Scientific Interest fall within Leiston Parish boundaries: Leiston and Aldeburgh SSSI; Sizewell Marshes SSSI; Minsmere & Warbleswick Heaths and Marshes SSSI and National Nature Reserve (NNR). The neighbourhood plan as it progresses should avoid any proposal or activity that would be likely to damage or destroy the interest features of this SSSI.

Designated Landscape

Your plan area is within or adjacent to Suffolk Coasts and Heaths AONB and the Suffolk Heritage Coast. We advise that you take account of the Suffolk Coasts and Heaths AONB Management Plan and seek the views of the AONB Partnership.

Local Wildlife Sites

The following Local Wildlife Sites fall within the parish boundaries:

Reckham Pits Wood; Leiston Common; Sizewell Levels & Associated Area; Suffolk Shingle Beaches and Buckles Wood. 2. Framlingham

3. Great Bealings

International and European Designated Sites

Whilst there are no International and European sites actually within the Parish boundaries the Deben Estuary SPA and Ramsar are in close proximity. If these designated sites are likely be affected by any proposals set out in the Neighbourhood Plan, for example by additional built development or by increased recreation pressure, a Screening Assessment may need to be carried out under the Habitat Regulations. This HRA Screening can draw upon the Appropriate Assessment of the Core Strategy and Development Management Policies, which we have found to be satisfactory.

Nationally Designated Sites

The Deben Estuary Site of Special Scientific Interest is in close proximity to the Great Bealing parish boundary. The neighbourhood plan as it progresses should avoid any proposal or activity that would be likely to damage or destroy the interest features of this SSSI.

Local Sites

The following Local Wildlife Sites fall within the Parish boundaries:

Kiln Farm Wood; Meadow Cottage Wood; and Queech Wood

4. Melton

International and European Designated Sites

The Deben Estuary SPA and Ramsar fall within the Melton Parish boundaries. If these designated sites are likely be affected by any proposals set out in the Neighbourhood Plan, for example by additional built development or by increased recreation pressure, a Screening Assessment may need to be carried out under the Habitat Regulations. This HRA Screening can draw upon the Appropriate Assessment of the Core Strategy and Development Management Policies, which we have found to be satisfactory.

Nationally Designated Sites

The Deben Estuary Site of Special Scientific Interest falls within Melton Parish boundary. The neighbourhood plan as it progresses should avoid any proposal or activity that would be likely to damage or destroy the interest features of this SSSI.

Designated Landscape

Your plan area is within or adjacent to Suffolk Coasts and Heaths AONB. We advise that you take account of the Suffolk Coasts and Heaths AONB Management Plan and seek the views of the AONB Partnership.

Local Sites

The following Local Wildlife Sites fall within the Parish boundaries:

Hospital Grove; Woods Lane Meadow and Milton Mead; and Melton Picnic Site

5. Rendlesham

International and European Designated Sites

The Sandlings SPA falls within the Parish boundaries. It is also closely sited to the Staverton Park and Thicks Special Area of Conservation (SAC). If these designated sites are likely be affected by any proposals set out in the Neighbourhood Plan, for example by additional built development or by increased recreation pressure, a Screening Assessment may need to be carried out under the Habitat Regulations. This HRA Screening can draw upon the Appropriate Assessment of the Core Strategy and Development Management Policies, which we have found to be satisfactory.

Nationally Designated Sites

The Sandlings SSSI falls within Rendlesham Parish boundary and Staverton Park and Thicks SSSI is also in close proximity. The neighbourhood plan as it progresses should avoid any proposal or activity that would be likely to damage or destroy the interest features of this SSSI.

Designated Landscape

Your plan area is within or adjacent to Suffolk Coasts and Heaths AONB. We advise that you take account of the Suffolk Coasts and Heaths AONB Management Plan and seek the views of the AONB Partnership.

Local Sites

The following Local Wildlife Sites fall within the Parish boundaries:

Whitmore Wood; RAF Bentwaters; and Rendlesham Forest

6. General Information

The following is offered as general advice to assist the Town/Parish Council or Neighbourhood Forums.

Natural England, together with the Environment Agency, English Heritage and Forestry Commission has published joint advice on neighbourhood planning which sets out sources of environmental information and ideas on incorporating the environment into plans. Protected species

You should consider whether your plan has any impacts on legally protected species. To help you do this, Natural England has produced standing advice to help understand the impact of particular developments on protected or Biodiversity Action Plan species should they be identified as an issue. The standing advice also sets out when, following receipt of survey information, you should undertake further consultation with Natural England. Natural England Standing Advice

National Character Areas (NCAs)

We suggest that you could make reference to the National Character Areas (NCAs) which divide England into 159 distinct natural areas. Each is defined by a unique combination of landscape, biodiversity, geodiversity and cultural and economic activity. Their boundaries follow natural lines in the landscape rather than administrative boundaries, making them a good decision making framework for the natural environment. The above Parishes fall within NCA 82: Suffolk Coast & Heaths except

Framlingham and part of Leiston which falls within NCA83: South Norfolk and High Suffolk Claylands. Key facts and data on these areas are available on our website: http://www.naturalengland.org.uk/publications/nca/eastofengland.aspx

Opportunities for enhancing the natural environment

Neighbourhood plans may provide opportunities to enhance the character and local distinctiveness of the surrounding natural and built environment; use natural resources more sustainably and bring benefits for the local community, for example through green space provision and access to and contact with nature.

Opportunities to incorporate features into new build or retro fitted buildings which are beneficial to wildlife, such as the incorporation of roosting opportunities for bats or the installation of bird nest boxes should also be considered as part of any new development proposal.

If, as you develop your plan, you consider that it will significantly impact on designated nature conservation sites or protected species or has other significant impacts on the natural environment then you should consult Natural England again.
