

# Habitats Regulations Assessment Screening Statement

## Draft Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement

July 2024

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#### 1. Introduction

- 1.1 The Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations (2017) (as amended) provide protection for sites that are of exceptional importance in respect of rare, endangered or vulnerable natural habitats and species. The network consists of Special Areas of Conservation (SACs) and Special Protection Areas (SPAs). Both types can also be referred to as European Sites. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) states that Ramsar sites should be afforded the same level of protection and refers to SACs, SPAs and Ramsar sites as 'Habitat Sites'.
- 1.2 The requirement to undertake Habitats Regulation Assessment (HRA) of plans and projects is set out in the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations (2017) (as amended).
- 1.3 Regulation 105 of the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations (2017) states:

'Where a land use plan:

- (a) Is likely to have a significant effect on a European site or a European offshore marine site (either alone or in combination with other plans or projects), and
- (b) Is not directly connected with or necessary to the management of the site, The plan-making authority for that plan must, before the plan is given effect, make an appropriate assessment of the implications for the site in view of that site's conservation objectives.'
- 1.4 The HRA is therefore undertaken in stages and should conclude whether or not a proposal or policy would adversely affect the integrity of any sites.
  - Stage 1: Determining whether a plan is likely to have a significant effect on a European site. This needs to take account of the likely impacts in combination with other relevant plans and projects. This assessment should be made using the precautionary principle. The screening assessment must reflect the outcomes of the 2018 judgement of the Court of Justice of the European

Union<sup>1</sup>, which has ruled that where mitigation is necessary this must be identified through an Appropriate Assessment.

Stage 2: Carrying out Appropriate Assessment and ascertaining the effect on site integrity. The effects of the plan on the conservation objectives of sites should be assessed, to ascertain whether the plan has an adverse effect on the integrity of a European site.

Stage 3: Identifying mitigation measures and alternative solutions. The aim of this stage is to find ways of avoiding or significantly reducing adverse impacts, so that site integrity is no longer at risk. If there are still likely to be negative impacts, the option should be dropped, unless exceptionally it can be justified by imperative reasons of overriding public interest.

- 1.5 The Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement is being produced by East Suffolk Council. The Position Statement applies to site WLP2.4 'Kirkley Waterfront and Sustainable Urban Neighbourhood' allocated in the East Suffolk-Waveney Local Plan, March 2019. This report considers whether there are likely to be significant effects on protected Habitat sites and whether a full Appropriate Assessment may be required.
- 1.6 East Suffolk (outside of the Broads) is covered by two Local Plans, the East Suffolk Council Suffolk Coastal Local Plan adopted September 2020 and the Waveney Local Plan adopted March 2019 (the Waveney Local Plan being the relevant development plan related to the Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement).
- 1.7 Both Local Plans were subject to Habitats Regulations Assessment as part of their production. Where screening identified a likely significant effect, Appropriate Assessment was undertaken and the mitigation measures identified were incorporated within the Plans, resulting in conclusions that the plans will not lead to any adverse effects on Habitat sites within and in the vicinity of the (then) Suffolk Coastal and Waveney Districts. Both Appropriate Assessments identified recreational disturbance particularly from dog walkers

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as a significant effect. The Council has subsequently produced a Recreational Avoidance and Mitigation Strategy and requires payment towards mitigation from residential developments within 13km of the protected Habitat sites.

### 2. Protected sites covered by this report

2.1 Sites included in this assessment are listed in Table 1. This includes all sites that are within 20km of site WLP2.4 'Kirkley Waterfront and Sustainable Urban Neighbourhood' of the East Suffolk- Waveney Local Plan. The locations of the sites are shown on maps in Appendix 2 and the Qualifying Features and Conservation Objectives of the sites are contained in Appendix 3, along with a summary of the pressures and threats as documented in the Appropriate Assessments for the Local Plans.

#### 3. Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement

- 3.1 This HRA report reviews the draft reviews the 'Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement Proposed Scope and Structure (April 2024)'.
- 3.2 Site WLP2.4 'Kirkley Waterfront and Sustainable Urban Neighbourhood' is allocated in the East Suffolk- Waveney Local Plan, March 2019. The Kirkley Waterfront Development Brief Supplementary Planning Document (SPD), was adopted in May 2013, and is a material consideration when determining planning applications for the site. Since the adoption of the SPD in 2013, planning policy has changed both nationally and locally (with the adoption the Local Plan in 2019) and other elements have also changed, such as the construction of a new bridge across Lake Lothing. The Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement will support the implementation of Policy WLP2.4 of the East Suffolk Council - Waveney Local Plan (adopted March 2019) by clarifying the requirements of the Kirkley Waterfront Development Brief SPD and providing up-to-date guidance regarding the planning policy situation and the expectations of the Council. The Position Statement provides updated advice and policy interpretation guidance but will not amend the Local Plan policy.
- 3.3 The Position Statement is to be read alongside the Planning Policy and supporting text in the Local Plan and the guidance in the SPD. The Position Statement will follow a similar structure to the SPD to assist the reading of the documents together:
  - Introduction
  - Context
  - Land use
  - Streets and transport
  - Open space and biodiversity
  - Urban design guidance
  - Flood risk management
  - Outline masterplan
  - Implementation
  - Planning application requirements

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The introduction and context chapters to the Position Statement will explain the the role of different planning policies and documents and update recent changes to the site (e.g. delivery of the Gull Wing bridge across Lake Lothing) and any changes in policy context. As this section is factual and descriptive it has not been included in the screening table in section 5 of this report.

3.4 Other section of the Position Statement provide detailed guidance on different aspects of the site and policy requirements. These sections have been screened individually in section 5 of this document.

#### 4. Other Plans and Projects

- 4.1 Regulation 105 of the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations 2017 (as amended, including through EU exit legislation) requires consideration to be given to whether a Plan will have an effect either alone or in combination with other plans or projects.
- As noted in the introduction, the other key plans are the Local Plans. The Local Plans set out the broad scale and distribution of development across the area of East Suffolk formerly covered by Suffolk Coastal District and Waveney District. The Local Plan of relevance the Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement is the East Suffolk Council- Waveney Local Plan which was adopted in March 2019. The Local Plan sets out the broad scale and distribution of development across the northern area of East Suffolk formerly covered by Waveney District Council.
- 4.3 The draft Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement will support the implementation of policy WLP2.4 of the East Suffolk Council Waveney Local Plan (adopted March 2019) and existing SPD for the site. The Position Statement is to be read alongside the Policy and supporting text in the Local Plan and the guidance in the SPD. Policy WLP2.4 allocates the site for, amongst uses:
  - approximately 1,380 dwellings (including a retirement community)
  - approximately 7.5 hectares of employment land
  - a new primary school and pre-school
  - a local retail centre
  - a playing field; and
  - marina facilities
- 4.4 Through the production of the Waveney Local Plan, a screening process considered each policy (including allocation policies) in the Local Plan and concluded whether significant effects are likely and that an Appropriate Assessment is needed. The Appropriate Assessment of the Waveney Local Plan subsequently considered the following themes:
  - Transport and air quality
  - Water quality
  - Flood risk and coastal erosion,

- Tourism, retail and employment development, and
- Recreation (described as visitation in the HRA)
- 4.5 Mitigation measures were identified within the Appropriate Assessment and were incorporated within the Local Plan, resulting in a conclusion that the plan will not lead to any adverse effects on the integrity of Habitat sites within and in the vicinity of the (then) Waveney District.

- 5. Assessment of likely significant effects of the Draft Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement on Habitat sites
- Table 3 below considers each relevant section of the draft Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement in relation to whether there is potential for a likely significant effect on protected Habitat sites. This constitutes Stage 1 as set out under paragraph 1.4 above. Consideration is given to the characteristics and location of the protected sites. The relevant sections are considered within the context of the Local Plan policies which have themselves been subject to Habitats Regulations Assessment, as set out in section 4 above.

clarifying the requirements of the Kirkley Waterfront Development Brief SPD and providing up-to-date guidance regarding the planning policy situation and

the expectations of the Council. The Position Statement is to be read alongside

the Planning Policy and supporting text in the Local Plan and the guidance in

the SPD.

6.3 Implementation of the Kirkley Waterfront Planning Position Statement will not

lead to likely significant effects on protected Habitat sites.

6.4 Natural England were consulted on a draft of this Screening Statement as

statutory nature conservation body. Their response is contained in Appendix

4. Natural England confirmed they had no comments to make on the

conclusions of this screening statement.

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




