Parking in East Suffolk – now simpler to pay!

Too many parking apps for different locations? Good news!

Motorists parking in East Suffolk Council-owned car parks can now choose from a selection of cashless payment providers.

We've joined the pilot phase of the National Parking Platform (NPP), a multi-vendor cashless parking solution delivered by the Department for Transport. Joining the NPP gives drivers the choice to use their preferred parking app or website, rather than having to use a single provider which the Council has chosen on their behalf. This makes paying for parking easier, quicker and more convenient.

In addition to RingGo, there will now be other parking providers to use when paying for parking cashlessly in all 73 chargeable Council-owned car parks across East Suffolk. Currently: PayByPhone, JustPark, APCOA Connect and AppyParking+. More suppliers may become available later. 44

Cllr Toby Hammond, East Suffolk's cabinet member for Economic Development and Transport said: "By joining the platform during the pilot stage, we have a unique opportunity to help shape the future of the scheme, ensuring that residents and visitors in East Suffolk will benefit from reliable and secure cashless parking services for years to come."

All East Suffolk car parks will still accept cash using the on-site payment machines. A valid ticket will still need to be clearly displayed if paying by cash. Monthly and annual tickets already purchased through RingGo will cross over to the new platform automatically and will remain valid.

Half million-pound fund for emergency response

A new fund has been established to provide immediate, shortterm financial support to East Suffolk communities affected by emergency events like flooding.

In February, as part of the 2024-25 Budget setting process, we created a Resilience Reserve in response to the severe disruption caused by Storm Babet last October. Now, Cabinet members have agreed how this £500,000 pot will be managed, through a newly established Resilience and Emergency Response Fund (RERF).

The RERF is designed to ensure East Suffolk Council can be more flexible and responsive to ensure reasonable additional costs incurred by town and parish councils during an emergency event are covered.

In the aftermath of Storm Babet, longer-term grants were available under central government's flood recovery framework, however a gap was identified to support the immediate and urgent needs of residents and communities; such as, provision of skips to remove damaged household items; and costs (food, bedding, clothing) for displaced people using the emergency centres.

East Suffolk Council's cabinet member for Resources and Value for Money, Cllr Vince Langdon-Morris, said: "In East Suffolk alone, 320 properties were directly impacted by Storm Babet last October.

"As much as we cannot sit back and allow climate change to irreversibly worsen, we must also try and support communities affected by its ongoing impacts, including flooding from rising sea levels, prolonged rainfall and intense storms. This fund can bring significant relief for our residents at a time of need.

"However, importantly, the RERF is a short-term resource and is in no way a replacement for central government support."



In addition to the RERF, a dedicated council officer will be appointed, to build upon our existing emergency response capacity, providing a communication, co-ordinating and enabling role for our town and parish councils, communities and residents before, during and after future emergency events.

Keeping your wellbeing in mind

We've produced a brand-new booklet called 'Well Minds East Suffolk' containing an extensive range of advice and information, including details of local support services for people of all ages in need of help with their mental health.

10,000 booklets have been distributed to community settings across the district, including libraries, community centres and the network of Warm Welcomes, part-funded by the Council. You can also download it to share or read online and it has been funded by the East Suffolk Community Partnership Board.

Cllr Sarah Whitelock, East Suffolk's cabinet member for Communities, Culture, Leisure and Tourism, said: "Improving the mental health and wellbeing of our residents is one of the main priorities for this

Administration. We know that many people in East Suffolk are struggling with their mental health following the Covid-19 pandemic, the high costs of living and other challenges.

"There are a lot of specialist groups who can offer advice, but it can be difficult at a time of crisis to know where to look. These new booklets bring all the information together providing a valuable resource for anyone in need of help, or who is looking for guidance with a friend or family member."



£500,000 to boost our towns!

East Suffolk towns have benefited from over £500,000 in investment thanks to our Towns Revitalisation Programme, helping to ensure that all our towns are economically vibrant and can achieve long term sustainability both for the local community, businesses and visitors.

The programme has developed and delivered a varied and wide-ranging series of projects to support the 11 key towns, plus the one large village of Wickham Market. From initial research, establishing priorities for local stakeholders, to the creation of action plans and funding bids, the programme has always been based on local needs.

The main themes of the programme have included:

- · Capacity building
- · Marketing and branding
- Skills development
- Digital development
- High street improvements
- Events development

The programme has benefited from both external funds from Government allocated to support town centres, as well as funding directly from East Suffolk Council. Our own East Suffolk Towns Initiative has provided grants of £120,000 allocating funding of £10,000 to each location. We have also provided a further £150,000, plus additional staffing costs to these schemes.

High Street improvements

Among a range of different schemes, the Town Development Programme has delivered public space capital improvements helping to strengthen the importance of town centres for social and cultural activity and to create more vibrant places where people choose to visit, live, work and invest. This has been through a grant programme using both East Suffolk funds and UK Shared Prosperity funding and has seen a raft of public realm and wayfinding capital improvements supported.

Actions include renovated town signs and maps in Bungay as well as installation of new benches, finger posts and dropped kerbs; updated town maps in Beccles; updated town maps in Beccles; updated town maps in Woodbridge along with new wayfinding and signage; new town maps in Leiston; updated maps and signage in Wickham Market as well as new benches; new planters for Lowestoft town centre; new wayfinding in Halesworth including fingerposts and maps plus displays of local artwork and photographs in empty shop windows in Halesworth and updated maps and town trail information in Framlingham.

Circular economy in East Suffolk

What is the circular economy?

The circular economy is a model of production and consumption, which involves sharing, leasing, reusing, repairing, refurbishing and recycling existing materials and products for as long as possible.

In this way, the life cycle of products is extended. In practice, it implies reducing waste to a minimum. When a product reaches the end of its life, its materials are kept within the economy wherever possible thanks to recycling. These can be productively used again and again, thereby creating further value.

East Suffolk Council is keen to promote and support businesses, Community Interest Companies (CIC) or social enterprises that support the circular economy!

How it's done!

East Suffolk Council has provided grants to Creative Leiston Community Interest Company (CIC), which operates Project40Seven, based in the heart of the High Street in Leiston. The CIC has received three grants from the Council's 'Ease the Squeeze' (ETS) programme set up to help residents with the rising cost of living, but with an emphasis on reducing, reusing and recycling.

These include an ETS Field to Fork Growing Spaces grant for the 'Leiston Land Army' allotment to grow produce for distribution within the Leiston Pantry and the local affordable food supply network- with a focus on reducing food waste. The Pantry itself was funded through an ETS Community Pantry Grant to provide more affordable food to residents via a 'social supermarket' model and within its first year of operation has saved 14 tonnes of food goods from entering the waste stream.

Creative Leiston has also set up a Uniform Exchange (which received a ETS Uniform Bank grant) to enable local parents to access new and good condition second hand uniform items and sports clothes. The multi-use space also includes drop in sessions, life skills courses, Crafted, Refill Zero Waste Shop, a community cafe and will soon have its Library of Things in operation.

Energy Efficiency Net Zero **Grants**

East Suffolk Council's Energy
Efficiency grant programme has
been created to maximise existing
or emerging local strengths in low
carbon technologies and goods,
and supports the development
of a carbon net zero East Suffolk
economy. It's a small grant with
big plans!

Small to medium enterprises can benefit from a grant offering between £10,000 - £15,000,

covering up to 50% of the project costs. The grant scheme supports the priorities of moving to net zero, or reducing a company's carbon footprint, by making energy efficiency improvements such as new windows, or solar panels, capital purchases such as electric vehicles, building upgrades such as insulation, and machinery upgrades to more modern or new technologies which reduce the business carbon footprint.

To date, East Suffolk Council has supported 10 businesses across the region. Projects range from the installation of solar energy systems, to the purchase of an electric van.

East Suffolk welcomes back

the Tour!

The Lloyds Bank Tour of Britain Men is back in East Suffolk this September, and for the first time ever, the entire final stage will take place right here within the district!

It will mark the seventh edition of the men's Tour to have visited Suffolk, and it will also be the first time that the county has hosted the prestigious final stage – with the last day of Britain's biggest professional cycle race getting underway in Lowestoft and finishing in Felixstowe on Sunday 8 September.

Since its return in 2004, the Tour of Britain has become a cornerstone of the UK sporting calendar. More than 15 million people have watched the event in person, with the race generating over £330m for the UK economy to date.

Cllr Sarah Whitelock, East Suffolk Council's cabinet member for Communities, Culture, Leisure and Tourism said: "We are thrilled to see the return of the Lloyds Bank Tour of Britain Men this year, which is especially exciting as the entire final stage will be held within East Suffolk. "National sporting events such as the Tour of Britain bring huge benefits to the area, attracting visitors to the district and providing a real boost for local businesses and communities. We are looking forward to September and seeing this amazing sporting spectacle in our district."

What does the Tour bring to East Suffolk?

An Economic Impact Report, produced by Suffolk Growth, revealed that over 113,000 spectators lined the 192.4km route of last year's stage through the county, with an estimated 53% of these coming to see the event from outside of the local area and 89% pledging to visit the area again. The local hospitality industry also benefited with an estimated 9,500 attendees enjoying overnight stays.

30% of spectators cycled to the event with 52% inspired to cycle more often as a direct result of watching the race, supporting Suffolk's ambition to get more residents cycling and benefiting from the physical and mental wellbeing it can provide.

A Suffolk Growth spokesperson said: "This report is a welcome confirmation of the benefits and positive impact of hosting major events in Suffolk. The Tour of Britain 2023 showcased Suffolk domestically and globally as a fantastic visitor destination, but equally the event presented a timely economic boost to the hospitality sector and an opportunity for communities to meet and celebrate along the route."

Green Light says Go

A charity dedicated to transforming lives through the power of nature has received a major funding boost from East Suffolk Council towards completion of a unique new learning centre.

East Suffolk Council has committed £110,000 of grant funding towards the Green Light Trust's vision to provide health and wellbeing programmes from the new building at Castan Wood, in Martlesham, for children, young people and adults with complex needs.

The environmental education charity launched an appeal last November to raise the money needed for completion of the carbon negative, cement-free learning centre – built using a hemp-based modular construction system.

The Green Light Trust already hosts a range of outdoor, woodland activities aimed at providing equitable access to nature at the 26-acre site. East Suffolk Council's contribution from earmarked reserves will assist completion of the centre, which received initial support from Suffolk County Council and the Suffolk Growth Investment Fund.



Councillor Rachel Smith-Lyte, East Suffolk Council's deputy cabinet member with responsibility for the Environment, approved the grant in consultation with cabinet member for Resources and Value for Money, Vince Langdon-Morris.



Cllr Smith-Lyte said: "I'm thrilled that we have been able to support the Green Light Trust's appeal to raise money for completion of this new purpose-built eco exemplar indoor learning centre.

"This is a unique site and organisation offering essential support in a nature-based setting, and the project utterly aligns with our determination to improve the wellbeing of our residents, and tackle health inequalities."

East Suffolk – **HERE for you!**

500 projects – supporting our communities



Our eight Community Partnerships have funded more than 500 projects across the district, led by community groups and voluntary organisations. Each partnership identifies priorities using data plus insight from local groups.

These range from BoxUp (sports and leisure equipment hire boxes), in Lowestoft, to a 'Let's Talk Dementia' grant scheme for the Aldeburgh, Leiston and Saxmundham area and a Youth Opportunity Fund in Framlingham, Wickham Market, Kelsale and Yoxford to support young people to access opportunities they might not otherwise be able to afford. Over £200,000 has been invested to deliver schemes like this so far.

Cllr Sarah Whitelock, Cabinet Member for Communities said: "We are moving into a new phase of the Community Partnerships, with a real focus on tackling inequalities across East Suffolk as part of our overarching Strategic Plan ' Our Direction 2028'. We want to supercharge their impact, make them even more ambitious, and hear more voices through the partnerships, including children and young people."

The Community Partnership Board, which oversees the whole programme, also has an additional £300,000 to allocate each year. In 2023/24, this funded a range of projects as well as funding for our two disability support charities (Disability Advice North East Suffolk and Disability Advice Service), our Healthy Habits booklet for Year 6 students, and additional funding for our Ease the Squeeze programme.

Need a helping hand?

Our **Community Help Hub** works to improve people's quality of life and provide support with the cost of living. Our Community Help Officers provide supported access to health and wellbeing services in a way that meets your needs, while our Financial Inclusion Officers provide help with money: from budgeting advice and help with benefits, to referral for debt help and applying for grants.

Sara's story

Sara and her two children lived in a poorly-maintained privately rented house. Sara was struggling with money and her health, had some problems with her children's school, and was finding it all really hard. The Community Help Officers supported Sara to make and attend GP appointments, follow the suggested treatment plan and engage with mental health services, giving her the confidence to build a more positive relationship with the school. The Financial Inclusion Officers reviewed Sara's income and spending, and found that her benefits were incorrect.

They helped her to increase her income by over £400 a month and to apply for a grant to help with everyday costs. She received £3,000 in backdated benefits which helped her to pay off her debts. The Community Help Hub also assisted Sara to follow a formal process with her landlord to get the repairs to her house completed, and supported her to improve her general wellbeing, loneliness and isolation by putting her in touch with others in her community.

Holiday fun for those who need it most

The Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) programme is live once again, providing activities for children and young people, particularly those who are vulnerable and in receipt of benefits-related free school meals. The programme funded by the Department of Education; in Suffolk, the HAF is overseen by Suffolk County Council and coordinated for this district by East Suffolk Council.

Numerous organisations across the district provide fun activities and food over the Summer, Christmas and Easter holidays. Film-making, theatre, cooking, sport, arts and outdoor adventure are just some of the free activities on offer during the school holidays as part of HAF. These activities bring young people together, get them moving and introduce them to new experiences and skills.

This summer holiday, there are 46 programmes on offer with over 7,700 places available!

Places can be booked by eligible families through the booking system: www.eequ.org/suffolkhaf. Families can select the programmes and dates they wish to attend, and which young people will be attending. The booking system will ask about HAF eligibility, and the booking will be reviewed by the HAF Team at Suffolk County Council.

Cost of living support

Ease the Squeeze is designed to help residents with the cost of living. It includes a broad range of projects that support people in lots of different ways, from helping with school uniform to helping you grow your own vegetables. So far, Ease the Squeeze has supported thousands of residents.

To keep people warm and connected we funded dozens of Warm Welcome spaces in local communities, provided free winter warmth packs and, working with health partners, piloted a 'warmth on prescription' project aimed at the over 60s and children with respiratory conditions.

To make sure people have enough good quality food to eat, we are building a food network across the district to increase the supply of affordable food, have funded two community pantries, provided people with equipment like slow cookers and microwaves and with cooking lessons, supported the Holiday Activities and Food programme targeting thousands of children across the district and launched Field to Fork, an exciting initiative to encourage people to grow their own food.

On top of this, we have organised uniform banks to help people access affordable school uniform, helped hundreds of residents who have referred themselves for support, worked with partners to source furniture and household items for those desperately in need, and have drawn together useful information on other sources of support for our residents online and offline.

Field to Fork – an Ease the Squeeze scheme

Field to Fork has distributed over 1,700 free home growing kits to families, helping people to grow their own food and enjoy the health and wellbeing benefits of gardening together as a family. We have also funded over 20 new community growing spaces where people can come together, learn more about growing and produce even more home-grown food. The project has saved nearly 10,000kg of CO2 and produced nearly £40,000 worth of fruit and vegetables.



Infrastructure... by East Suffolk Council!

Did you know that we help deliver new and improved community facilities through funding from developments? When new housing is delivered in East Suffolk, we collect money from developers, which WE invest back into our communities.

This includes fantastic projects such as extensions to schools and medical facilities, play areas, transport initiatives as well as community and leisure facilities. This year we collected £7.1 million, most of which is allocated to projects that support new housing growth in the right area at the right time. Since 2013 to we have also passed £6.7million on to Town and Parish Councils to deliver their local infrastructure projects.

So, how do we do this? It's called the Community Infrastructure Levy!

In 2023 six applications for district Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) were approved, including:

- Bungay Medical Practice extension and reconfiguration: £1.283million
- Melton Early Years Provision at Melton Primary School: £1.35million
- Improvements at Barnards Soccer Centre, Lowestoft: £101,500

Additionally, a new 'Local CIL' fund was launched last year which provides up to £50,000 to projects located in, or close to, an area where new development is taking place.

These include:

- Waveney Meadows Project, Beccles: £22,000
- Blundeston Play Park refurbishment: £25,000
- Skate Park and Nature Walk, Rendlesham: £50,000
- Klondyke Skate Park, Southwold: £50,000
- Southwold Roads Project: £23,000
- Safety upgrades Alan Hutchinson Way, Beccles: £17,500

We supported and funded the delivery of a new nursery school at Holton Primary School; 100% funded by over £1 million of CIL money to provide 30 much needed pre-school places.



Building healthier lives

We have recently published new planning guidance which sets out how new developments should be designed to support the health and wellbeing of residents.

The Healthy Environments
Supplementary Planning Document
(SPD) provides guidance on a range
of topics including the provision of
green open space, play provision,
trees and landscaping, active travel
infrastructure, healthy buildings such
as homes, schools and workplaces,
dementia-friendly design, community
facilities and more.

Cllr Kay Yule, Cabinet Member for Planning and Coastal Management at East Suffolk said: "This document provides guidance to support the delivery of places which improve health and wellbeing outcomes. This includes active travel infrastructure, food growing areas, accessible community spaces, play spaces and much more. It joins other guidance documents on topics such as sustainable construction, custom and self-build housing, the historic environment and affordable housing."

Neighbourhood Plans, prepared by Town and Parish Councils, set out planning policies on matters that are important to the local community and form a part of the framework against which decisions on planning applications are taken, along with East Suffolk Council's Local Plans. A number of communities have now prepared plans for their local areas, with residents in Easton and Playford most recently voting in favour of their Neighbourhood Plans being approved, adding to the 23 plans already in place in the district.

Keeping buildings safe

Building Regulations are an important set of standards which exist to protect people's safety, health and welfare in and around built environments. Anyone carrying out building work is responsible for ensuring that Building Regulations are complied with, and the role of Building Control teams is to make sure they do!

East Suffolk Council's Building Control team are among the best in the business, and this has been borne out by industry exams and professional interviews undertaken by the newly created governing body, the Building Safety Regulator.

New legislation dictates that all practicing Building Control professionals must prove their competency, with unregistered Building Inspectors unable to practice unsupervised after 6 April 2024.

Cllr Kay Yule, East Suffolk's Cabinet Member for Planning and Building Control, said: "Many private building control companies and other local authorities have struggled to recruit and retain experienced staff following these changes, so we are delighted to have one of the strongest, most qualified teams in the country.

"So many of the Building Control team are home grown and we have strong ambitions to grow the team further to ensure the built environment across East Suffolk remains safe."

Why Building Control matters

The Grenfell tragedy witnessed the subsequent creation and implementation of the Building Safety Regulator and Building Safety Act 2022. The legislation is governed by the Health and Safety Executive who redefined the expectations of competence across the entire construction industry.
