### **Chief Executive** to retire



#### East Suffolk Council's long-serving Chief Executive Stephen Baker has announced that he is to retire.

After a career in local government which has spanned four decades, culminating in 17 years at the helm of East Suffolk and its predecessor councils, Stephen will step down from his post at the end of this year.

As Chief Executive of the biggest district council in the country by population, representing 250,000 people across an area covering 487 square miles, Stephen has been at the forefront of local government innovation, becoming one of the country's first ever joint Chief Executives when taking up the reins at Waveney District Council alongside his role at Suffolk Coastal.

He then oversaw more than a decade of successful, cutting-edge partnership working, culminating in the creation of East Suffolk Council, delivering the best possible services for local people.

His leadership helped demonstrate that councils can deliver reform, innovate and transform themselves - with the streamlining and strengthening of local government principles and the delivery of a model for others to follow.

Stephen's career in local government began at Ipswich Borough Council in 1982, before being appointed Chief Executive at East Northamptonshire District Council in 2002 and Suffolk Coastal in 2005.

Stephen said: "Being in this role has been an absolute privilege, and it's been a really tough decision, but now is the right time for me to move on. The East Suffolk team have always been amazing, working so hard, making the job both exciting and a real pleasure; I thank them for all their support during my time as their Chief Executive.'

# EASE THE



We understand the pressures faced by many people today due to the rising cost of living and we are working closely with key partners to ensure support is available to help ease the squeeze for households in East Suffolk.

As a response to the ongoing cost of living crisis, we are developing a comprehensive support programme to help residents in East Suffolk who are struggling.

Initially, 12 projects will be delivered through the Ease the Squeeze programme, which focuses on money, fuel and energy, food and essentials and housing.

So far, we have committed £350,000 to the programme, and we are working to secure further funding to ensure we can continue to provide the support our residents need during this difficult time. Projects include:

#### **Comfort Food**

This voucher-based food support project provides hot meals and drinks to households in East Suffolk who are struggling with the cost of living. Eligible households are issued with a voucher which can then be redeemed at participating local cafés.

Thanks to donations from councillors, the scheme launched in Beccles in September. and we will roll it out across East Suffolk as soon as possible to help provide food for those who need it.



#### **Warm Rooms**

This project will provide a place where people can stay warm without increasing their own energy bills as well as connect with others in their community, therefore also helping to address isolation and loneliness. We are currently in the process of identifying possible Warm Rooms across East Suffolk which will benefit from a grant towards their costs. Other projects in the programme include Community Pantries, Uniform Banks, Winter Warmth packages and cooking classes.

# Working together on local priorities



East Suffolk's Community Partnerships are an exciting way for East Suffolk Council to bring ideas to life. We are working with key partners to solve local problems identified by local people and make a real difference in our communities.

One of the main priorities for each Community Partnership is tackling social isolation and loneliness, and here is how they are making a difference.

#### Book a lift with Buzzabout

A new community transport service has been launched to help people living in the villages north of Lowestoff get out and about more easily.

Operated by BACT and funded by East Suffolk Community Partnerships, Buzzabout uses a 16-seat minibus which can be booked to pick people up at existing bus stops, from their home or anywhere else they need, taking them exactly where they want to go! Buses are fully accessible, including for wheelchair users

The service operates on Mondays and Thursdays between 8.30am and 4.30pm and can be booked by calling BACT on 01986 896896.

A recent survey found that 23% of residents in the villages to the north of Lowestoft do not have access to a car or traditional public transport, leaving them feeling isolated and dependent on other people. East Suffolk's Community Partnerships set up a Transport and Travel group to address rural transport issues and are working across East Suffolk to introduce new on-demand transport options.



#### **Robopets**

To help older residents, especially those living with dementia, 20 companion pets were purchased for local dementia groups and care homes across the district. The pets, which are robotic cats and dogs, provide the interactive companionship associated with owning a pet which can be therapeutic for many people, especially those living with dementia. Animal therapy is widely recognised to bring calm and comfort to people with dementia and these realistic 'robopets' provide the same benefits.



29 projects focusing on reducing social isolation received Hidden Needs grants of between £2,057 – £10,000. Our Boost Grant programme awarded more than £169,000.

# Around the partnerships!

Melton, Woodbridge and Deben Peninsula:
£10,000 was awarded to Hollesley Village Hall Committee towards replacing the village hall roof. Hollesley Village Hall is used widely by local residents and those from surrounding villages for social clubs, functions and activities, as well as providing a base for medical appointments.

Felixstowe Peninsula:
Felixstowe Allotment
Association's new
headquarters are now
complete, thanks in part to
£3,000 in funding from the
partnership. The building will
be used as a meeting place
for allotment holders and as
a venue for the community
and local schools when
they visit.

Beccles, Bungay, Halesworth and villages:

£436 was allocated to enable Beccles Rotary Club to replace a bench near to St Michael's Church Tower in Beccles. The bench was originally installed in 2005 and has become a popular spot for local people to sit, chat and meet new people.

Community Partnerships represent a major investment by East Suffolk Council, with a total delivery budget of £1,730,000 over four years

# Biodiversity matters

Cllr James Mallinder, Cabinet Member for the Environment, on East Suffolk's commitment to the natural environment.

"The environment is embedded in our decision making, as can be seen in East Suffolk Council's Strategic Plan. Our aim is to educate, encourage and to lead by example.

"Biodiversity is such a great asset for those who visit, work and live in East Suffolk; partly due to its ability to help fight the impact of climate change but also for all the benefits it brings. Sadly, we are losing biodiversity at an alarming rate – but we can all play our part to help protect, enhance and restore nature in East Suffolk so that everyone has a chance to enjoy and benefit from nature – now and in the future.



"Since 2020, we've created 100 conservation areas across the district that are managed to encourage wild flowers to grow, support pollinators and provide habitats to a range of species.

"You can spot these sites across East Suffolk when you see our 'Pardon the weeds, we are feeding the bees' signs – and you may have seen our wildflower border at our East Suffolk offices in Melton quite literally buzzing with life this summer! This has been joined by a host of bird boxes, pond and insect hotels.

"Next year we will continue to work to create more wild spaces, which we will manage to help wildlife thrive through reduced cutting and by sowing wildflower seeds. We have also reduced the spraying of herbicide on Council-owned land by 45% and are investigating ways we can control weeds on footpaths without chemicals.

"By making these changes, we are hopeful these conservation areas will benefit both wildlife and local people living nearby."

#### So what can I do?

#### Can I make a difference?

This is a question we should all ask ourselves. If we all do something, that's the key — small changes make a big difference. Things you can do at home include:

- Create a wildlife friendly garden, using native flowers, log piles, wild areas and reduce mowing.
- If you don't have a garden, you can still help nature by hanging bird feeders or planting window boxes and tubs with wildflowers.
- Install a water butt to harvest rainwater.
- Add a compost bin.
- Volunteer with a local group managing green spaces.

# Our journey to net zero

Having declared its recognition of the climate emergency to reinforce our commitment to the environment, East Suffolk Council has set a target of 'net zero' greenhouse gas emissions by 2030. So how are we doing?

East Suffolk Council conducts an annual audit of the emissions arising from its estates and activities. In 2021/22, total quantified emissions stood at 5267 tonnes of  $\rm CO_2$  equivalent ( $\rm tCO_2e$ ).

Based on the council's total quantified emissions for 2021/22, the three largest contributors to our footprint are our vehicle fleet, leisure centres and housing stock. These are collectively responsible for 85.5% of the council's emissions. For this reason, our internal emissions reduction plans are currently focused on these key areas.

For example, the council has implemented, as an interim alternative to diesel, the use of Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil as fuel for the majority of its fleet which has the potential to reduce quantified emissions of the fleet by up to 90%. We also have ten electric cars and vans on our fleet, and in 2021/22, the use of these ten electric vehicles helped the council avoid emissions of around 14tCO<sub>2</sub>e had their work been done by diesel or petrol vehicles instead.

In 2021/22, our business mileage was down 56.6%, and emissions from our business mileage were down 57.8%, when compared to the year 2019/20.

### The Greenprint Forum... making a difference!

The Greenprint Forum is a voluntary network helping **East Suffolk Council deliver** our mutual environmental goals and everyone is welcome to join.

The Greenprint Forum and East Suffolk quality of life for people living in East Suffolk, whilst reducing our impact on the environment. They share knowledge, organise events and training, and where need is identified, help to draw in resources to enable actions to take place.

#### Supporting citizen science

Volunteers joined a Beachwatch activity organised by the Greenprint Forum in Felixstowe in September, combining a beach clean with citizen science by recording the types and quantities of marine litter found on the beach.

This data, along with data from volunteers all around the coastline of the UK, helps the Marine Conservation Society understand the composition of litter in our oceans, helping them to lobby for positive action in an evidence-based way, for example by successfully lobbying for the ban on the sale of single-use straws and stirrers.

#### Supporting community action for nature

The Greenprint Forum is running a small grants scheme called Nature First, funded by East Suffolk Council.

So far, the volunteer panel has awarded over £14,000 to 19 projects across the district, including an intergenerational project by Kinda Education, planting for the future, a seven hectare link between Upper Holton and the valley of the River Blyth; a project by Kesgrave Town Council to rewild a 260m stretch of land that connects two large public areas through the planting of trees along with sowing grass/wildflowers seeds around them, with the involvement of local volunteers from the community; and work by Enterprise Badingham to restore and enhance their community gardens, encouraging biodiversity within the gardens and churchyard whilst preserving a popular amenity for the

#### Do you want your home to be warmer?

Are high energy bills preventing you from putting the heating on? Do you know any friends, family or neighbours who need extra help heating their home?

We are here to support you and keep Suffolk warm.

**Suffolk's Warm Homes** Healthy People project helps vulnerable people and families make their homes warmer and cheaper to heat, improving health and wellbeing.

Our friendly team will listen to your concerns and can provide a range of support, including:

- FREE home surveys for home-owners and those privately renting. A trained energy surveyor will visit your home to identify ways we can make your home more efficient and maximise your home
- FREE loft, cavity wall, external wall and internal wall insulation.
- Grants for the servicing of gas
- FREE new or replacement heating/ energy systems including those utilising renewable energy such as solar photovoltaics and heat pumps.
- Referrals and signposting for emergency fuel payments. This includes heating oil and pre pay key and card meters.
- Loan of temporary oil filled electric heaters for those with faulty/no heating.

- Extra winter warmth help for the most vulnerable
- Access to an interest free loan for other heating and energy related measures.

To be eligible for the funded projects households must meet the following criteria (evidence of income will be required):

- Be a home-owner, privately renting, or a landlord of a tenant who meets the below financial criteria
- Have a combined household income under £30,000, OR, receive one of the following: Guaranteed Pension Credit, Universal Credit, Housing Benefit, Income Based Employment Support Allowance/Job Seekers Allowance, Child/Working Tax Credit with income under £16,105
- Live in a property with an energy performance certificate (EPC) of D or
- Grant funding will be prioritised to those with savings under £30,000.

### Green scheme wins national award

#### Proposals for an environmentally-friendly housing scheme in Felixstowe have won a national award.

Deben Fields is the housing element of a highly sustainable residential-led mixed-use development which will also deliver the new Felixstowe Sports Hub and leisure facility. And in September, architects Tate Hindle were honoured for the quality and high standards of their designs by the national Housing Design Awards.

The entire scheme is being delivered by East Suffolk Council and will deliver 61 new properties, 42 of which will be affordable homes. It seeks to set the very highest standards in green technology and is designed

to achieve 'Passivhaus' certification, reflecting the Council's commitment to innovation and designing for a more sustainable future.

The development maximises green space and enhances biodiversity while still providing designated parking for all homes. The inclusion of 'play streets' brings further emphasis to the pedestrianised nature of the site, creating safe and welcoming spaces for residents to walk, meet and socialise.

This development will provide an exemplar affordable housing scheme which champions lowcarbon design, reduces running costs for residents and sets a benchmark for future housing developments in East Suffolk.

### **Resilient coasts**

East Suffolk Council in partnership with Great Yarmouth Borough Council has made a successful bid to Defra's Flood and Coastal Resilience Programme (FCRIP).

An £8.4m funding award has been confirmed to test and demonstrate innovative practical actions to reduce damage, disruption, and loss from flooding and coastal erosion. The evidence and learning will inform future approaches to, and investments in, flood and coastal erosion risk management across the UK.

#### What is the Resilient Coasts Project?

Norfolk and Suffolk have some of the fastest eroding coasts in Europe, with over 2,500 homes at direct coastal risk and thousands more properties and businesses directly and indirectly affected by loss of property, infrastructure and utilities. The Resilient Coasts Project will implement an ambitious resilience programme for the East Suffolk and Great Yarmouth coastal frontage, that delivers real adaptation and resilience options for our communities.

Coastal Partnership East, the coastal management team for East Suffolk Council, Great Yarmouth Borough Council and North Norfolk District Council, will be managing and delivering the project.

The Resilient Coasts project will be implemented in four core pilot locations across the East Suffolk and Great Yarmouth frontage, plus four additional 'twin' locations. The pilot areas in East Suffolk are Thorpeness and Southwold with twin areas in Pakefield and Corton/Gunton. The work will be delivered in close collaboration with our coastal communities.

# 'Efficient, clean and super green' refuse lorries hit the streets

East Suffolk Council has welcomed the addition of 'efficient, clean and super green' biofuel-powered trucks to its fleet of refuse collection vehicles. The arrival of the vehicles on the streets of East Suffolk is the latest move towards switching the entire fleet to eco-friendly fuel.

Last year, the Council approved plans to switch its diesel fleet to be fuelled by HVO (Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil) and reduce total greenhouse gas emissions by more than 30%.

Fourteen new vehicles have since been hired to replace those with older engines not guaranteed for the use of HVO fuel – significantly contributing to reducing CO<sub>2</sub>e emissions by about 2,000 metric tonnes per year.

Cllr James Mallinder, East Suffolk Council's Cabinet Member for the Environment, said: "The environment is one of the core principles of our Strategic Plan. Not only that, we declared a climate emergency, really enforcing that statement that the environment is at the heart of everything we do at East Suffolk Council.

"I'm delighted, therefore, that we have introduced Hydrotreated Vegetable Oil as a fuel for our waste trucks. This is making a really important difference in our carbon footprint, reducing it by over 30% for the council as a whole, and over 90% for the fleet – a real, meaningful change, making a difference to all our residents' lives.

"Our new trucks are efficient, clean and super green. You'll notice them out and about collecting your waste, and this is really important because it's reducing the carbon footprint across the whole of East Suffolk, making a difference, caring for the environment and helping build an environmentally sustainable community for you and for future generations."

## Stay safe during a flood

Ahead of the winter months, it's a good idea to give some thought to protecting your home against flooding, especially if you live in an area which has flooded before.

The best way to protect yourself from flooding is to know what to do in advance.

One of the easiest things to do is sign up to receive flood warnings by phone, email or text when flooding is expected.

Sign up for warnings at www.gov.uk/
sign-up-for-flood-warnings. You can also check active flood warnings at www.check-for-flooding.service.gov.uk, create a personal flood plan using a template available from www.gov.uk/flood, or call Floodline for advice on 0345 988 1188 at any time.

There are three different levels of flood warnings:

A flood alert means flooding is possible and you should be prepared.

 Prepare a bag including medicines and insurance documents.

A flood warning means flooding is likely and you should act immediately.

- Turn off gas, water and electricity
- Move things upstairs or to safety
- Move family, pets and car to safety

A severe flood warning means there is a danger to life.

- Call 999 if in immediate danger
- Follow advice from the emergency services
- Keep yourself and your family safe

If your home is likely to flood, it can be hard to find home insurance.

#### Sandbags

In Suffolk, sandbags are not provided to individual properties. In an emergency, sandbags may be used in bulk by responders to strengthen existing flood defences or to divert water away from groups of properties. However, experts agree that sandbags do not sufficiently stop water from entering a property during a flood, as water can get in through other doorways, utility points and sewers. Houses or businesses at risk from flooding need proper flood defences installed, such as removable flood boards or gates. These are significantly more effective than sandbags in preventing water entry through doorways and air bricks.

An advanced renewable and sustainable fuel, HVO offers up to 90% reduction in carbon emissions compared to diesel.



## Thinking Electric?



Electric vehicles are becoming increasingly commonplace and East Suffolk Council is working with partners across the county to increase the number of public chargers available, including offroad parking solutions for those without a driveway or garage.

Electric vehicles produce zero emissions when you use them, which is great for the environment and air quality compared to petrol and diesel cars. Although they have a lower range than a similar petrol or diesel car, and take time to charge, the possible distances are rapidly improving and the vast majority of journeys will be well within the average range.

The public charging network is expanding rapidly and there are a number of online maps and apps of charging points now available.

# £24.9million regeneration programme given final go-ahead for Lowestoft

A £24.9m programme to transform Lowestoft has received final Government approval, enabling work to progress on five major regeneration projects.

In 2019, Lowestoft was one of 100 towns invited by the Department for Levelling Up to develop a bid for up to £25m of the £3.6bn Towns Fund. The Lowestoft Town Investment Plan, developed alongside the Lowestoft Place Board, setting out the ambitions, opportunities and challenges of the next 10 years, was submitted to the Government in 2020 as the basis of a £24.9m application.

Full funding was provisionally secured in March 2021 before detailed businesses cases were submitted for each of the five projects in March 2022.

Businesses and visitors will be able to view proposed designs and learn more about each project in the coming months, with all five projects having now received final approval and due for completion by March 2026.

The funding focuses on five projects:

- The Station Quarter: Full restoration of the former Post Office and front of Lowestoft railway station building.
- The Cultural Quarter: Improvements to the Marina Theatre, redevelopment of the East Suffolk Council's current Customer Services Centre to provide a new cultural facility, and redevelopment of the former Battery Green multi-storey car park to provide a new leisure offer.
- The Historic Quarter: Redevelopment and refurbishment of the Town Hall, along with enhancing the historic 'Scores'.
- The Seafront Vision: Redevelopment of Royal Plain, including the Royal Plain fountains, Royal Green and associated public realm to complement the recently refurbished East Point Pavilion.
- The Port Gateway project: Supporting development of the Lowestoft Eastern Energy Facility (LEEF) to secure Lowestoft's future as an Operations and Maintenance hub for the offshore renewables sector.

# Providing beach access for everyone

### Accessibility is at the heart of two Lowestoft beach schemes.

First, a new boardwalk enabling people with disabilities to access Lowestoft's South Beach more easily has been officially opened.

The boardwalk, developed by the Waveney Disability Forum, working closely with East Suffolk Council, provides year-round access on to the beach for people with disabilities, particularly wheelchair users, as well as people with pushchairs.

Constructed by Beccles-based contractors Foxwood Building Services, the boardwalk was completed ahead of the recent First Light Festival and was officially opened at a ribbon cutting ceremony attended by representatives from the Waveney Disability Forum, East Suffolk Council and Foxwood Building Services.

In addition to the boardwalk, 10 of the new Eastern Edge beach huts have been designed with accessibility in mind. These are located on Eastern Edge's lower tier and are accessed directly from the promonado.

Some of these huts can be linked together, by arrangement, for those needing a larger accessible space. These are also ideal for hire by community groups, schools, for team activities or corporate use.

# Fishy goings-on at Port Health

Based at the Port of Felixstowe, our Port Health Team work hard to check over 80,000 consignments every year, ensuring imports are fit for human consumption and use.

Recently, the team have encountered some strange creatures during their work!

In June, the team made a gruesome discovery inside a consignment of seabream. Parasites which sever and take the place of fish tongues had infected the fish, which were intended for human consumption. Port Health officers inspected the consignment after the importer failed to supply the correct paperwork and found the Cymothoa exigua parasites had infested most of the container load. The consignment was rejected and returned to the importer.

And in May, the team encountered a giant river prawn at the Port of Felixstowe with limbs up to 40cm in length. The giant freshwater prawn is one of the biggest in the world and is known to grow anywhere between 30 and 50cm. This fantastic beast passed all the necessary health checks with flying colours!

As well as working at the UK's busiest container port, the team also provide health checks on food and animal-related imports at Harwich International Port and the Port of Ipswich.







### Never miss a moment

# Her Majesty the Queen

The councillors and officers of East Suffolk Council were deeply saddened by the death of Her Majesty the Queen in September.

Floral tributes were laid at sites across the district, including by the Chair of East Suffolk Council Cllr Jenny Ceresa who laid a floral tribute at Royal Plain in Lowestoft.

During her long reign, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II visited East Suffolk twice, both to Snape and to Lowestoft.

In June 1967, The Queen officially opened Snape Maltings Concert Hall with Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, taking time to speak with members of the choir and orchestra before attending an hour-long inaugural concert. On the same day, she visited the Moot Hall in Aldeburgh.

Home to the renowned Aldeburgh Festival, the Snape Maltings Concert Hall was the idea of Lowestoft-born composer Benjamin Britten. During her visit, The Queen told Benjamin Britten: "You have encouraged the arts to flower in the soil of this pleasant part of Suffolk."

A large fire damaged the hall on the opening night of the Aldeburgh Festival in 1969, destroying the interior of the building. However, the hall was restored and reopened in June 1970, with The Queen attending the first concert in the rebuilt Snape Maltings.



In 1975, she opened the £11m Post Office Research Centre at Martlesham Heath - the most advanced telecommunications research facility in Europe and in 1977, Her Majesty The Queen celebrated her Silver Jubilee and visited Felixstowe.

In August 1985, Her Majesty The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh visited Nicholas Everitt Park in Oulton Broad and officially opened Lowestoff Museum, cheered by crowds of people. She also unveiled a plaque in Lowestoff, naming part of London Road North as Queen Elizabeth II Place, which is located to the south of the junction with Gordon Road.

### Treebilee tribute

Earlier this year, two hundred oak trees were planted in communities across East Suffolk to commemorate Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee.

Through the 'Treebilee' scheme, English oak trees were donated by East Suffolk Council to every town and parish council in the district, both to mark Her Majesty The Queen's 70-year reign and to help tackle climate change.

The Treebilee scheme was also an opportunity for towns and parishes to contribute to East Suffolk's vision for environmentally sustainable communities, while creating a living and lasting memorial of The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

A commemorative plaque was provided with each tree



Trees naturally absorb CO2, a key greenhouse gas, through the process of photosynthesis, helping to create a significant natural carbon sink.

A mature oak tree can host up to 5,000 different species of invertebrate, supporting a healthy food chain and benefitting many different birds and mammals.

# Supporting residents with energy bills

Earlier this year, we helped to issue the Government's £150 energy rebate payments through our Council Tax system, to help people with their rising energy bills.

Since these payments were announced in February, we have worked hard to provide over 93,000 eligible households in East Suffolk with their energy rebate payment, totalling more than £14 million.

By the end of June, we had completed our part of the Energy Rebate scheme and were amongst just 11 councils in the country who had made 100% of their payments by that date.



We have also been managing an additional discretionary scheme to provide support to eligible households in Council Tax bands E to H, who were not eligible for the £150 rebate.

# East Suffolk Free Public Wi-Fi now across the district

To support local towns and businesses, East Suffolk Council is delivering a range of digital projects to help strengthen the local economy and improve connectivity within the district's market towns.

One of these projects is the East Suffolk Digital Towns programme which has recently seen public Wi-Fi and visitor footfall counting technology installed in Beccles, Felixstowe, Halesworth, Southwold and Woodbridge.

This followed a successful pilot programme in Framlingham which has been running since 2019, and has been extended for a further four years. The programme has been supported by funding from the Getting Building Fund and New Anglia Local Enterprise Partnership's Innovative Projects Fund.

Once registered, you can access East Suffolk Public Wi-Fi in any of the towns where it is installed. Aldeburgh, Bungay, Leiston and Saxmundham will also have the technology in place before the end of the year.

The data the technology provides does not allow an individual to be recognised however it will enable the council to understand the number of visitors to the town, the busiest periods and seasonal trends, the impact of events on the town, and much more.

This will help the council's Economic Development Team provide tailored support for local businesses and data-led evidence to support other projects. More than 12,715
