### Your Council

East Suffolk Council was created in April 2019 following a decade-long partnership between the former Suffolk Coastal and Waveney District Councils. We made history by becoming the first brand new 'super' district council, having already saved £22 million worth of taxpayers' money through the original partnership.

There are 55 councillors in East Suffolk representing a total of 27 different wards. All councillors are elected every four years, with the next vote taking place in 2023. A councillor's primary role is to represent their ward and the people who live in it. You can find more information at

This year, we've committed to spending £129 million on delivering essential services to residents, businesses and communities across East Suffolk.


We know many residents are struggling financially due to the pandemic - so, to help you, we've frozen our element of council tax for 2021/22.

This means that if you live in a Band D property, for example, you will pay £14.27 per month to East Suffolk Council (£171.27 per year) – the same amount as last year.

Covid-19 has presented significant financial challenges for the Council however we have used our reserves – which are set aside to use in emergencies like this – to enable us to continue our support of residents, communities and businesses during the pandemic, whilst remaining financially sustainable ourselves.

This is a key ambition within our Strategic Plan - ensuring the Council provides value for money to residents, delivering the best services possible and using our assets wisely to generate income which can be put back into services.





East Suffolk residents living in a band 'D' property will pay £1,879.37 per month in Council Tax during 2021/22. This is divided between the following organisations as follows:

Suffolk County Council £1,397.16 (74.3%)

Town & Parish Councils £73.25 (3.9%)

Suffolk Police & Crime Commissioner £237.69 (12.7%) East Suffolk Council £171.27 (9.1%)

Only £14.95 million of our £129 million budget comes from your council tax payments. The rest comes from other sources including income, business rates and Government funding.

We are always looking at ways we can save money – one idea is to install solar panels in our buildings and car parks to reduce energy costs, which is also better for the environment!

# At your leisure

Over the past four years, we've invested over £10 million in improving our leisure centres by providing refreshed, state-of-the-art facilities that can be enjoyed by our communities for many years to come.

We are entirely committed to providing access to high quality leisure facilities for everyone who lives in East Suffolk and the multi-million-pound programme, which has transformed our venues is precisely the kind of financial investment which we believe will improve the lives and outcomes of our residents.


What we've done so far...

### Free digital advice service helps local businesses thrive online

Covid - helping our communities

We have been working with volunteers, businesses and local organisations to support the most vulnerable members of our communities during the pandemic.





### Connecting Older People

Due to a lack of Wi-Fi, equipment or skills, some older people have been unable to contact their loved ones. To reconnect them, we introduced the Grandpad Loan Scheme in partnership with Ipswich and East Suffolk CCG.

'Grandpads' are specially designed tablets with large buttons and an intuitive interface which makes it easier for older people to use. The devices have unlimited 4G internet, 24/7 personalised support and unlimited minutes, so users can easily make video calls at no extra cost.

The scheme is being trialled for a year, with 90 older people currently using the Grandpads and after this time, it is hoped we can secure funding to extend the scheme to even more people in need.

### Home, But Not Alone

East Suffolk Council has played a leading role in the local response to the pandemic.

Our Communities Team, working with partners, community groups and volunteers, have helped a large number of people in need since the pandemic began.

As part of the Home But Not Alone Scheme, developed by the Suffolk Collaborative Communities Board, our Communities Team dealt with 2,172 requests during the first lockdown, including 750 urgent food or medicine needs.

If you do not have any support available from friends, family or neighbours and are struggling for food, medicines or other essentials or are feeling isolated, you can call the Home, But Not Alone service on 0800 876 6926 (9am to 5pm, Monday to Friday).

## Support For The Most Vulnerable

To provide further support, we created a Hardship Fund worth over £150,000, with contributions from every councillor, our Community Partnership Board and Communities Team. Grants of between £50 and £2,500 were given to local groups to support pop-up food banks, telephone befriending services and volunteers delivering medicines across the district.

We also supported over 500 residents who are clinically extremely vulnerable to ensure they received food parcels and supplied foodbanks across East Suffolk - not just with food but also with free sanitary items for those in need.

By using video calling, the Suffolk Family Focus team has continued to support families experiencing complex and long-standing difficulties, such as domestic violence, drug and alcohol dependency, and financial issues.

## Community Partnerships

The East Suffolk Community Partnerships were established following local workshops in Autumn 2019. Each has been allocated funding by the council to focus on specific issues in their neighbourhoods and 'bring ideas to life'.



The East Suffolk Community Partnerships are:



- Lowestoff and northern parishes
- Melton, Woodbridge and Deben Peninsula

### Here's just some examples of how local communities -are benefiting:

### Felixstowe Peninsula Community Partnership:

Education has been identified as a key priority and £5,000 was allocated to a library project at Felixstowe School.

The grant has enabled the school to buy new reading books as well some specialist reading items, such as audio books and devices, headphones, large PC screens and new furniture.



### Kesgrave, Martlesham, Rushmere St Andrew, Carlford and Fynn Valley Community Partnership:

To address social isolation, the CP allocated £5,000 to deliver two Mental Health First Aid Awareness training sessions to enable its communities to support people's wellbeing long-term.

The sessions are aimed at local people who are used to public interactions and able to offer, or signpost to, the support required by individuals.

### Beccles, Bungay, Halesworth and Villages Community Partnership:

The CP allocated £3,250 to Bungay Town Council for a project to reclaim its old cemetery, creating a beautiful tranquil environment for local people to enjoy, with many mature and possibly some ancient yew trees.

This will enable local residents to explore local history as well as better protect and enhance a flourishing natural habitat.

## An **environment** for all

Since the creation of East Suffolk Council in April 2019, we have developed an ambitious environmental vision for East Suffolk and we are committed to become carbon neutral by 2030.

As a result, a climate emergency was declared in June 2019 and a cross-party Environment Task Group established to ensure the environment plays a key role in all decisions, choices and policy formation.

### Pardon the weeds, we're feeding the bees

Last year, we created 40 wild spaces across East Suffolk where grass was left to grow longer and wildflowers planted to help wildlife thrive. These spaces are cut back for winter and the signs removed..... but they will return this spring!

### We're charging forward with new ELECTRIC CARS

We're continuing to proactively take steps to reduce our carbon emissions and introduced six new electrical vehicles to our fleet run by partners, East Suffolk Norse, in August 2020.



### Help us provide an efficient refuse service

Please ensure you're following the bin guidelines so our refuse teams can continue to provide an essential service efficiently:

- Put bins out by 6am latest on collection day
- Recycle where possible through the blue bin
- Present bin at the boundary of your property where your access meets the public highway or other agreed collection point
- Don't force too much waste into a bin as it can stick inside, meaning it won't come out when emptied
- Ensure bins do not contain any incorrect items, as it may not be emptied
- Ensure the lid on bins are closed for collections, otherwise we won't be able to empty it
- Take bins in as soon as possible after collection as they can cause a serious obstructions and block access, particularly when left on public pavements and access ways

## Better Housing for a brighter future

East Suffolk Council is committed to delivering vital new housing and is fully focused on addressing housing shortages with a target to build 50-plus new homes a year ourselves.

We have a programme of redevelopment, bringing older properties back in to use as well as new build homes which will see a further 148 more homes available over the next three to four years

And we are also developing a minimum energy efficiency standard to ensure our housing development programme is actively contributing towards the council's aim for carbon neutrality by 2030.

As part of our programme, we were delighted to introduce six new shared-ownership properties to our housing stock towards the end of last year – the first of their kind in the district

The properties are located in Brampton with Stoven near Halesworth and provide an affordable ownership scheme, which combines purchasing a share in a home with a rental agreement for the remaining unowned share.

We want to develop more schemes like this for the benefit of our communities, and to support locations which desperately need new, affordable and high-quality housing options.

# Housing for older people

To ensure there is a suitable mix of homes for all residents, East Suffolk's Housing Enabling Team will be conducting a piece of research in the spring with a focus on the housing needs, desires and aspirations of our older residents.

This survey will be open to all residents regardless of age or tenure and will guide the themes and priorities of the 'Older Persons Housing Strategy' which will be published next year.

### Making parking simpler

### RingGo – no more hunting for coins!

Available in all of East Suffolk's car parks, the simple RingGo app allows you to park quickly and easily, paying for parking using your credit or debit card rather than using cash at the machine. Using RingGo means you no longer need to queue at the machine or handle cash to pay for your parking.

RingGo is free to use so you won't pay extra for your parking. However for a small charge, the RingGo app has the option to send reminders when a parking ticket is about to expire, so drivers can top up their ticket or return to their vehicle, avoidina receivina a parking fine for staying too long. We're keen to use technology to make life easier but we want to ensure parking is still accessible to everyone, and so cash payments can still be made at the ticket machine. Download the RingGo app from your app store.



- More people are now using contactless payments in our car parks – payments via the app increased by 129% between 2019 and 2020.
- Last year, almost 300,000 parking sessions were booked in East Suffolk's car parks using RingGo.
- There is no extra charge to use RingGo to pay for parking, unless you choose to receive a text reminder when your parking time is running out.

### Tackling inconsiderate parking

To help reduce nuisance and illegal parking, parking management moved from the police to East Suffolk Council in April 2020. This enables the Council to tackle parking problems which can cause ongoing issues within our communities.
Inconsiderate and illegal parking can impact on businesses and residents and pose a danger to other road users and pedestrians. By tackling this and enforcing existing regulations, we can ensure sufficient parking is available for residents and visitors alike.



- We're working with town councils in Framlingham, Lowestoff and Southwold to make sure parking is appropriately managed for residents, businesses
- If you see illegal or nuisance parking in your area, you can report it at any time at eastsuffolk.gov.uk/parking
- Our parking services staff patrol approximately 70,000 streets and off-street parking places in the district.

### **Permits**

We have also introduced a new 'parking portal' for on-street parking permits, exemptions and dispensations. This enables residents to apply for, and manage permits, online. The system recognises valid permits from a vehicle's registration number, meaning that permit holders will no longer need to remember to display their permits.

### **New tariffs**

To make parking prices fair and consistent across the district, we have introduced new simplified tariffs in our car parks. In many areas, ticket prices remain the same or are reduced. 75% of people parking in our car parks will pay just £1 or £1.50 for a two hour stay.

We have also introduced free half hour parking in many towns to support people making regular short visits. This will also support local businesses who will benefit from drivers making quick turnarounds in our car parks.



In more than 70% of car parks, ticket prices have been frozen or reduced.

## A brighter future for our towns

A huge amount of investment in improvement and regeneration projects is breathing new life into our two biggest towns!

### Felixstowe

### The Kitchen @ Martello Park

As part of wider investment in the South Seafront area, a new landmark building is under construction. Known as The Kitchen @ Martello Park, the striking building will house a new café and restaurant which will be run by the Dedham Boathouse Group, offering indoor and outdoor dining with unspoilt



views of the sea. The £1.5 million project, funded by East Suffolk Council and the Coastal Communities Fund, is being undertaken by local builders Barnes Construction and is expected to be completed in the summer.

### **Seafront Gardens**

Quality green spaces are essential for residents, now more than ever and last year, Felixstowe's iconic Seafront Gardens were awarded a coveted Green Flag for the fifth time, recognising them as some of the very best in the world. The award celebrates the dedication that goes into maintaining the Felixstowe Seafront Gardens to such a high standard – much of this is done by volunteer Friends of the Seafront Gardens who work alongside the lead gardeners to help keep the Gardens looking at their best.



### **Shelters**

The Council has invested in the refurbishment of public shelters on the South Seafront including the Manwick Shelter which was recently damaged by fire, and the long-term maintenance of the historic Martello Tower 'P', which forms the centrepiece of the park.

### Heritage-led Regeneration


The Lowestoff Heritage Action Zones (HAZs) are heritage-based regeneration projects led by Historic England in partnership with East Suffolk Council. The North Lowestoff HAZ focuses on the North Lowestoff Conservation Area with its medieval High Street and Scores, as well as the Ness - the UK's most easterly park.

The newly created London Road, Lowestoft High Street HAZ runs from the Surrey Street junction on London Road North to the Carlton Road junction on London Road South in Kirkley.

Both schemes are working to secure lasting improvements and help breathe new life into the country's historic high streets for the benefit of local communities and businesses.

### **East Point Pavilion**

The East Point Pavilion on Lowestoft's seafront will be repurposed following an advance grant of £720,000 through the Government's Towns Fund. The interior of the pavilion will be redesigned, providing flexible space for community and cultural activity, space for small entrepreneurial 'pop-up' businesses to operate from and a year-round café venue, which will be managed by the team behind the First Light Festival. Led by internationally renowned designers Hemingway Design and Hudson Architects, bringing this prominent building back into use will act as a catalyst for further regeneration along the seafront.



### Flood scheme

Flood risk has long been an obstacle to growth and regeneration in the town, however the creation of Lowestoft's own permanent flood defences will provide certainty for the prospects of the town, galvanising its huge economic potential and heralding a bright and secure future for residents and businesses.

Last year, we celebrated an incredible award of over £43 million from the Government - a 'once in a century' opportunity to deliver tidal flood walls and a tidal barrier to protect and safeguard the future of Lowestoft.

When complete, the defences will reduce the risk of flooding to over 1,500 homes and businesses, unlocking further growth, creating jobs and apprenticeships and securing the future of Lowestoft for generations to come.

The innovative design of the flood protection scheme will incorporate glass flood walls at South Pier including words and artwork designed by local children to maintain the town's important connection to the sea.

### **Town Investment Plan**

In November, a Town Investment Plan which sets out Lowestoft's ambitions, opportunities and challenges over the next ten years was submitted to the Ministry for Housing, Communities and Local Government as part of a £24.9m application to the Government's Towns Fund. Accessing this funding will enable our ambitions for the town to move forward.

In 2019, Lowestoff was chosen as one of 101 UK towns to benefit from the Government's £3.6 billion Towns Fund.

Each town was invited to develop a proposal for a Towns Deal, with up to £25 million available to bid for. The Town Investment Plan forms part of the application for Lowestoft.



### **Town Centre Masterplan**

The Lowestoff Town Centre Masterplan is our response to the challenges Lowestoff town centre faces and provides a clear plan and direction to create a prosperous town centre whether as a place in which to live, work or have fun.

It provides the blueprint for change over the next 10-15 years but also incorporates more short-term plans which will help bring activity, jobs and business to the town centre.

Led by East Suffolk Council in partnership with Lowestoft Town Council, Lowestoft Vision, Suffolk County Council and Suffolk Chamber of Commerce, the masterplan considers ways to re-purpose and guide future development in the town centre and secure inward investment to revitalise the heart of Lowestoft.

Meanwhile, if the Secretary of State consents to the delivery of major energy projects in East Suffolk, such as the construction of Sizwell C, we will have an important role to play. This will not be our decision, however we will work hard to get the best outcomes for local people including more jobs and skills enhancements whilst ensuring that environmental protection is the best it can be.

# LOCAL ELECTIONS COMING SOON!

East Suffolk Council is responsible for the staging and smooth operation of ALL elections which take place locally, even if they are not for East Suffolk Council itself.

A number of different elections will be taking place on May 6 this year:

- Suffolk County Council
- Police & Crime Commissioner (postponed from 2020)
- A number of local by-elections A number of Neighbourhood Planning Referenda



Naturally, we will be following all Public Health guidance to ensure that polling stations are safe. Current (at time of print guidance) says that:

- Voters must wear a face covering in the polling station, unless they are exempt
- Voters may bring their own pen/pencil to mark
- Due to social distancing requirements, the number of voters in polling stations may be limited and you may have to queue.

### Census 2021 will provide a snapshot of modern society

### Households across East Suffolk are being asked to take part in Census 2021.

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

It will be the first run predominantly online, with households receiving a letter with a unique access code. allowing them to complete the questionnaire on their computers, phones or tablets.

"A successful census will ensure everyone from local government to charities can put services and funding in the places where they are most

needed," lain Bell, deputy national statistician at the Office for National Statistics, said.

"This could mean things like doctors" surgeries, schools and new transport routes. That's why it is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them."

Census day is March 21, however households across the country have already been receiving letters with online codes allowing them to take part.



The census will include questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.
