SAVINGS KEEP ON COMING

The pioneering shared services partnership between Suffolk Coastal and Waveney District Councils is now set to save around £5 million by March 2015, and this figure is continuing to increase.

The Leaders of the two Councils recently hailed their partnership as a 'blueprint for modern, local government service delivery' after it was confirmed that savings had now reached in the region of £900,000 per year.

The savings are part of both Councils' commitment to deliver services as efficiently as possible, keeping their share of the Coun-

cil Tax bill as low as possible, while also cutting waste and bureaucracy wherever it can be found.

The partnership has not only seen a shared Chief Executive and senior management team, but has also seen a number of shared operational teams formed.

The latest project to get the go-ahead outlines proposals to radically modernise the planning service of the two Councils. They will be merged in a move that is intended to ensure an improvement to overall performance and bring shared savings of over £800,000.



BACKING BETTER BROADBAND

Waveney is backing a county-wide campaign to improve broadband speeds in Suffolk by asking residents to complete an important survey.

People in Suffolk can boost the chances of better speeds by proving to the Government and suppliers that there is genuine demand in Suffolk and taking part in this survey is a way to do that

Leader of Waveney District Council Cllr Colin Law said: "Superfast broadband will not be rolled out across the country at the same time and it is clear that some regions will get to the front of the queue quicker than others.

"This is why it is vital that everyone in Suffolk completes this survey to show that the demand is there and that investment is desperately needed. I call on the people of Waveney

to stand up and be counted and help the County by taking just a few minutes to fill out the form. It really could make all the difference."

The county has one of the poorest broadband networks in the country, with an average speed of under five megabytes per second, but an ambitious £41.7 million project supported by local councils, businesses and national government is set to bring the area into the 21st century.

NEW MAN IN WORLINGHAM



Norman Brooks is the new ward Councillor for Worlingham having won a by-election for the Conservative Party on in December.

Replacing Andrew Draper who resigned his seat, he polled 706 votes, beating Sylvia Robbins of Labour (586) and Sue Bergin of the Green Party (137). Stuart Foulger of the UK Independence Party won 64 votes and Liberal Democrat Doug Farmer polled 46 votes.

The Conservative Party now, once again, has 23 seats on Waveney District Council. The Labour Party also has 23 with one Green and one Independent.

EYES OF THE WORLD

In a fantastic boost for Waveney and its communities, the Olympic Torch will be heading through the district on its journey around the UK ahead of this summer's sporting spectacular.

Dozens of towns and villages are gearing up for 5 July, following the announcement of the 'communities on route' in November and confirmation a fortnight ago of which roads it will take on its 70-day journey around the UK. In each of the chosen towns or villages, torchbearers will carry the flame right in front of local residents, businesses, visitors and - of course - the world's media.

Councillor Colin Law, Leader of Waveney District Council, said: "The 2012 Olympics will be one of the greatest events this country has ever seen and I am filled with the most enormous pride to know that the route of the Olympic Torch will weave through Waveney. It is the greatest honour and playing a part in history will mean a huge amount to the communities of this district."

The 70 day Olympic Torch Relay, will start at Land's End, Cornwall on the morning of 19 May 2012. On leaving Land's End, the Olympic Flame will travel an estimated 8,000 miles around the UK giving thousands of communities and individuals their moment to shine as the Olympic Flame comes to a place near them. The big day for Waveney is Thursday 5 July. Leaving Norwich in the

morning, the torch will pass through Acle, Filby and Great Yarmouth in Norfolk before heading to Lowestoft, Wrentham, Reydon and Southwold in Waveney.

From there it will go to Kelsale, Saxmundham, Aldeburgh, Wickham Market, Ufford, Melton, Woodbridge and Felixstowe in Suffolk Coastal before arriving for an overnight stay in Ipswich. In announcing the villages, towns and cities LOCOG are taking the Torch to within an hour's journey time of 95% of the population.

He said: "We are thrilled to confirm that these places in Suffolk will act as host locations for the Olympic Flame, extending an invitation to people across the county to welcome the Olympic Torch Relay during its journey around the United Kingdom.

"This is the UK 's moment to shine and I want to encourage people across Suffolk to start planning how they can be part of this once in a lifetime opportunity and show their support for the inspirational Torchbearers chosen to carry the Olympic Flame as we count down to the start of the Olympic Games."

2012-13 BUDGET: COUNCIL TAX FROZEN



Waveney District Council has approved plans to freeze the portion of Council Tax it receives for a second consecutive year. The budget, which details how the Council will spend its money and the income it receives, will see the portion paid to Waveney remaining at £147.51 for a Band 'D' property.

In addition the budget report also detailed the closing of a £909,000 budget gap thanks to an ongoing and concerted programme of savings and efficiencies – largely achieved through partnership working and the manage-

ment transfer of services such as Leisure and the Marina Theatre.

The ongoing shared services partnership with Suffolk Coastal has saved a further £228,000 in this financial year, while the transfer of Waveney's leisure services to the newly formed Sentinel Leisure Trust has realised a further £150,000. Meanwhile the decision to transfer the management of the Marina Theatre has helped the Council recoup £50,000 this year and the ongoing partnership with Waveney Norse has saved another £44,000.

However important income from the Government in the shape of the Formula Grant and the Housing Benefit Administration Grant

has been reduced and further reductions in subsequent years, aligned to other economic factors, has led Leader of the Council Colin Law to strike a warning note for the district.

He said: "Once again, Waveney has responded to great difficulties caused by the financial squeeze on local authorities by proposing a budget which will still manage to preserve the quality of frontline services. We have been able to achieve this as a direct result of the strategic decisions taken by this administration, without which our financial position wouldn't bear thinking about.

"I cannot applaud the hard work that has gone in to driving a range of efficiencies and savings more highly. There will be a considerable number of councils who would like to be in our position.

"However, the financial outlook for the next few years will present a significant challenge, requiring radical solutions to close a gap that could break through the £2million mark in 2015.

In addition, the Council's first ever formal, Strategic Business Plan, mapping out Waveney's social and economic vision for the next 10 years was also formally approved. Replacing the Council's current Corporate Plan, it outlines Waveney's professional and business focused approach to delivering services and, according to Cllr Colin Law, focuses much of its attention on the promotion of Economic Growth.

He said: "We want to be building thriving communities through a strong, sustainable, and dynamic local economy, offering our communities more stable, high quality and high value jobs, with increased opportunities for all, and providing affordable homes for local people.

At the same time we will continue to drive down the costs of local government and the public sector as a whole in a number of way. This will be a natural continuation and expansion of our approaches to 'Partnerships', 'Enabling' and 'Localism' that have already been delivering so much success."

PRAISE FOR FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT

In an official report presented to Full Council during 2011-12, Waveney District Council was praised by the Audit Commission for its excellent financial management.

The Audit Commission's Annual Governance Report assesses how well Waveney uses and manages its resources to deliver value for money and better outcomes for local people. In completing their report, the Commission praised the Council in a number of areas.

Highlighting budget savings and a commitment to budget planning, they commended Waveney for its 'longer term financial solutions rather than short term financial fixes.' The report also complimented Senior Management for its strong leadership and focus

on spending reductions, praising the shared services partnership with Suffolk Coastal for driving increased efficiency and savings.

Once again, the message from the Audit Commission is clear: Waveney is a financially robust Council reaping the benefits of strong leadership, improved performance and a strategy designed to address the pain of difficult times.

PLAYING FOR REAL



Students from the Denes Lower School in Lowestoft are taking charge of their local play facilities by working with the Waveney Play Partnership to deliver new facilities.

Having drafted exciting options for two play spaces, class 7EM led by their tutor Kerri Edmundson and Julie Mayo, came to the Town Hall in Lowestoft in February to make a final decision and pick a winning design! Last year they put their minds to designing a park and produced a 'manifesto' outlining the

needs for local young people in the local areas. This manifesto was presented to the Waveney Play Partnership, the group leading on improving free play opportunities for local communities across the district.

They also took part in two workshop events - led by Chris Ames, Waveney's Play & Sport Development Officer to research, debate and design a specification list for both projects; The Bleach and Denmark Road play spaces. These specifications formed the instruction to

renowned play companies to produce designs and quotes for the much needed improvements and on Friday 10th February the class of some 30 pupils filled the Town Hall Chambers at Waveney District Council to review, evaluate and decide on the winning design.

The event was chaired by Cllr Frank Mortimer, Waveney's Portfolio Holder for Customers and Communities to give the young people a taste of what the councils are really about and do on a daily basis. He said: "I could not be more impressed by the effort that these students have put in to this project. They should feel really proud of what they have accomplished together."

Work to create the chosen designs for both The Bleach and Denmark Road play spaces will begin after the Easter Holidays and they will be ready for use by the Summer Holidays. Cllr Chris Punt, Chair of the Waveney Play Partnership added: "The local children will now be able to watch as their creations come to life at the two sites. Once complete we will ask the school pupils to officially open the new provision and also create and propose artwork for the welcome signage to add that further personal touch to their play spaces".

Sign up online, make an 'OFFER' of something you want to get rid of, or a 'WANTED' for something you need. Freegle is a national grassroots organisation of people throughout the UK who are giving and receiving free un-

wanted items in their immediate communities. Local charities, non-profit groups and communities are encouraged to join.

All groups within the Freegle organisation operate with a basic principle – all offers and requests must be freegle (free and legal). The aim of Freegle is to keep anything reusable out of our landfill sites. With over 4000 members, Waveney Freegle is usually a very quick way to find a new home for that unwanted item. And there are added social

benefits as meeting new people helps to develop local community networks and friendships in the process.

Waveney Freegle is run by volunteers and is FREE to join and use. It is about to undergo an overhaul of the way in operates to make it even easier to use and more flexible. Three local Councillors (David Ritchie, Bruce Provan and Bill Mountford) have contributed money from their County Council locality budgets to enable this important development to happen.

WATERFRONT PLANS CATCH THE EYE

An important leap forward in the transformation of Lowestoft has been taken with the publication of exciting plans for the Kirkley Waterfront Area.

Following the recent adoption of an Area Action Plan (AAP) for the Lake Lothing and Outer Harbour Area by Waveney District Council, a detailed brief has been drafted with specific information about the kind of development that can be expected on the Waterfront and a recent consultation asked for opinions on the proposals.

The plans show the ambition to transform an underutilised, unattractive area into a vibrant, inclusive community with housing, employment opportunities, services and facilities in a high quality environment.

The development would be driven by an insistence on quality design of new buildings, street layout and public spaces to make the area somewhere people feel proud to live and work. It will maximise the opportunities presented by the waterfront, the central location and links to the town centre.

Cllr Colin Law, Leader of Waveney District Council said: "The proposed development outlined here is a significant project for Lowestoft. These plans are hugely exciting and seeing them on paper begins to bring the reality a little closer."

The aim of the Sustainable Urban
Neighbourhood and Kirkley Waterfront
Development Brief is to provide more detail
and guidance to assist with the
implementation of the proposals contained
within the AAP. Comments from the
consultation will be taken into account in the
final preparation of the brief before further
consultation on the final draft version. The
Council expects to adopt the brief later this
year.



AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Residents and communities are being asked for their views on affordable housing and how Waveney District Council will ensure an adequate provision for future generations.

One of Waveney's planning policies requires all new housing development to include a proportion of affordable housing or, alternatively, a financial contribution towards affordable housing on another site.

Alongside this policy, detailed guidance on how these measures would be implemented must be put in place.

Therefore a 'Supplementary Planning Document (SPD)' has been produced. It contains key criteria, mapping out how the Council will secure the delivery of affordable housing through the planning process. Prior to publishing the final version of the document, the Council is inviting comments on the draft document as part of a six week consultation.

The future of one of the East of England's most popular theatres, the Marina in Lowestoft, has been secured with the formation of the Marina Theatre Trust.

Waveney District Council will continue to own the building and will work closely with the newly-formed Board to maintain and improve the facilities and the calibre of show on offer. Following an extensive recruitment process, a number of highly experienced people from both the local community and theatre industry will now work with the venue management to ensure its continued success.

Chairman of the board is Hazel Clover, who with 25 years experience of working in the arts, theatre and entertainment business has

considerable experience managing art centres, concert halls, festivals, residencies and theatres. Meanwhile, former Marina Theatre Manager, Martin Halliday who led the bid to operate the Marina as a charitable trust, is the venue's new Chief Executive and the venue is now embarking on a programme of attracting the very best acts and shows to the theatre.

Cllr Stephen Ardley, Waveney's Cabinet Member for Partnerships said: "The Marina Theatre is without doubt the cultural jewel in the district's crown and building upon the enormous success the venue has had in recent years, We are certain the Trust will ensure that the high standard of productions and entertainment offered by the venue is maintained and indeed expanded."

Previously the venue's sole source of financial support came from Waveney with no financial support from either the County Council or any arts funding group. Initially, the role of the trust is to safeguard the venue and enable it to put on the kind of shows that contributed to its success in previous years.

This includes seeking a share of funding at county level and supporting Waveney to improve the venue for audience and artistes. Long term aims are to further enhance the programme, build and sustain new audiences and improve the venue's catering offer to provide substantial improvement to its income.

And so, with the Trust in place, what is currently on offer? Some fantastic shows that's what! The world famous Royal Philharmonic Orchestra recently announced an extension to its prestigious residency at the Marina Theatre into 2012. Meanwhile, having been the fastest selling tour ever and triumphing in the West End, the Calendar Girls are coming to Lowestoft. And if it's laughs you're after then there are few funnier than Al Murray, the pub landlord. Britain's most irrepressible Innkeeper will be in Lowestoft as part of his 2012 tour.

HALL TOGETHER NOW

Waveney District Council has handed over the management of Beccles Public Hall to a local charitable community group.

The Council has been determined to provide a sustainable option for the Hall which best protects the interests of the Council and the local community. Beccles Lido Ltd have already demonstrated that they have the skills and ability to develop and operate local facilities successfully following the transforma-

tion of the outdoor swimming pool and their business case met with the universal support of Councillors.

The Council has invested significantly in the Public Hall over the past decade, however the venue needs further investment to address structural issues and for refurbishment, allowing the hall to realise its full potential. Their vision for the Public Hall "is to develop a centrally located facility, where local people

can access and enjoy a wide range of activities from events, concerts and performances to special interest groups".

Cllr Stephen Ardley, Waveney's Cabinet Member for Operational Partnerships, said: "We have spoken at great length to the people of Beccles to establish what they want from the hall and it is clear that the Beccles Lido group will be able to deliver exactly what the town is looking for."



MEET MICK!

As a direct result of surveys carried out by the Housing Team last year, the Council have introduced an Estate Ranger for a trial period to help tenants on the Gunton and Whitton estates.

Mick Collins has moved from another job at Waveney to take up this brand new role and he is relishing the opportunity

So, what is an Estate Ranger? Well – it is a job that could change as the Council learns more about what is needed and when! As the Council has never had one before the role may need to change and adapt to meet the needs of tenants on both estates. Time will tell.

Mick will deal with very low level anti-social behaviour such as damage to property, graffiti, dog fouling, and other minor issues that affect a residents enjoyment of where they live. He will work closely with other agencies to try and ensure that Waveney is achieving improvements to the environment in which we live. Already he has built up a good liaison with Police and Environmental Health colleagues.

Early indications suggest that it could be a success and is being well received by those residents he has met. The focus of activity so far has been dealing with fly tipping and encouraging residents to improve their rear gardens, take pride in where they live and not park on the grass if they can help it!.

Plans are afoot for a brand new 'Estate Ranger newsletter and contacts are being made with local schools to help discourage younger children from behaving in a way that could be seen as anti-social while still wallowing them to benefit from using the great play facilities that we have on both estates.

COULD A LODGER EASE YOUR MONEY WORRIES?

Waveney Lodgings Scheme is a new scheme in your area run by Solo Housing, a registered housing charity working across East Anglia.

Prospective lodgers are interviewed by staff and assessed for suitability, then matched with a landlord/lady according to each person's requirements. The final choice of whether to offer the room to the lodger is always made by the landlady/landlord. The scheme is free and is partially funded by Waveney District Council.

Solo's lodgers are some of the many people who find themselves unexpectedly in housing need through relationship/family breakdown, redundancy, ill health or the rising cost of living. Lodgings can be a vital step back onto the housing ladder at a difficult time and can often prevent job loss, health problems and loss of contact with family and friends.

Sara, for example, is a bright 19 year old, is working hard to hold onto her first job, unable to afford a place of her own due to low wages and finding herself 'sofa-surf-

ing' between friends. Sara's family recently moved to a smaller house on the other side of the county after they couldn't afford to keep up with increased mortgage payments; it is too far for her to travel to work and in any case, there is no longer any space for her there. She is constantly worried about overstaying her welcome and afraid that she will run out of places to stay.

For Sara and many others like her, renting a room as a lodger could be the answer to their problem. It could also be the answer to their new landlady/landlord's rising house-



hold bills! Solo need more people now, who have a space to offer, in all areas of Waveney. If you think you might be interested in renting out a room in your home, they would love to hear from you. Whether you are an owner-occupier, housing association tenant or in private rented accommodation, why not give them a call for an informal chat, to find out more?

ON THE RIGHT TRACK



The Waveney Disability Forum is really making its mark in the district with a number of projects and awareness acivities.

This includes officially opening a 'Changing Places' facility at the Waterlane Leisure Centre, providing adapted hanging facilities within the newly refurbished venue.

Waveney District Council and Sentinel Leisure Trust have combined to source funding for the work to be carried out after consultation with Andrew Provan and Amanda Wiles, Co-Chairs of Waveney Disability Forum who led on behalf of local people with disabilities. Changing Places' is a national campaign to highlight the need for suitable facilities for people with severe disabilities.

Waveney Disability Forum was set up in September 2011, by the Council's Community Development Team, following a request from local people with disabilities who felt there was no representation from Waveney at a county-wide level.

Councillor Frank Mortimer, Portfolio Holder for Customers and Communities said "This was a clear need for a group to support disability needs at a district level and I am delighted that the Waveney Disability Forum is already making an impact."

Since starting up, the Waveney Disability Forum has undertaken a number of events and consultations, such at the successful 'ScootSafe' event to raise awareness of using a mobility scooter and powered wheelchair.

This Lowestoft event, with participants including Lowestoft Mayor Tod Sullivan (pictured), took place in partnership with Waveney District Council, Waveney Norse, Suffolk Police, Waveney Town Centre Partnership, DIAL and Shopmobility.

The Waveney Disability Forum also took part in the Council Accessing Services Event to promote a better understanding of the issues that may effect access to services provided by the Council, by People with Disabilities. Further consultations taking place include the national Government campaign 'Fulfilling Lives' and the Waveney District Council Local Area Agreement.

Motorists parking in Lowestoft and Oulton Broad will no longer have to hunt for change with RingGo 'cashless parking' being offered in Waveney District Council pay and display car parks in April!

RingGo is a special mobile phone service, enabling you to pay for your parking by credit or debit card, rather than with cash at a machine. With phone parking: you don't have to save up change; you don't have to trek to and from the machine; and you don't need to put a ticket on your dashboard - Civil Enforcement Officers check which vehicles have paid using internet connected handhelds.

If you've got an iPhone or Android handset, you can download and use the RingGo app to register and pay for your parking. Alternatively call the standard rate telephone number 020 3046 0010 (shown on signs in the car park), at the time you want to park. If you want to save time, you can pre-register in advance at www.myRingGo.co.uk. If it's your first time using the service, you'll be asked for information about your vehicle, the four

digit location code (shown on the sign) and your payment card. On following occasions the service recognises your mobile phone number and retrieves the information given, reducing time considerably. You can pay with RingGo via the apps, by calling, using a text message or on-line. Details of each are given on the myRingGo website.

As well as being convenient, paying with RingGo reduces the risk of receiving a parking charge notice. If you're running late or simply need a bit longer in town, there's no need to worry - just top up your parking wherever you are by using the service again.

The optional RingGo text reminders also help. These notify you 10 minutes before your parking time is due to run out, leaving you time to either extend your stay or return to your car (10p per reminder).

Cllr Stephen Ardley, Waveney's Portfolio Holder for Operational Partnerships, said: "It's a great idea and if it works well in Lowestoft and Oulton Broad we will roll the scheme out across the district."

AWARD WINNERS

Waveney District Council's teams are setting national standards and are being recognised for their outstanding achievements!

The Council received national recognition from APSE (Association of Public Sector Excellence) for its outstanding Building Maintenance work. APSE are the largest local authority benchmarking group in the country and Waveney won the Most Improved Performer award and were commended in the Best Performer category.

Meanwhile another Waveney team picked up a national award. The Council won the Best Performing NLIS Level 3 Local Land Charges Department award at the 2012 Land Data Local Land Charges Awards for Excellence.

The national awards celebrate the work and achievements of local authority local land charges departments, which carry out land and property searches required for property transactions throughout England and Wales. Last year, the Council was highly commended for the same award.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Waveney folk will be familiar with the Scores on the Doors scheme, which has been providing hygiene ratings for for restaurants, takeaways and other food businesses in the district. Now, these premises will have their standards measured against a new national scheme.

Waveney is launching the National Food Hygiene Rating Scheme and from the beginning of April food premises will be given a Certificate and Window Sticker displaying their Hygiene Rating. Under the national scheme these will range from zero - which means urgent improvement necessary - to the top rating of five, which indicates a 'very good' standard.

Also, importantly, the ratings for these businesses will be placed on the Food Standards Agency's website, alongside food businesses and premises from all around the country.

Cllr Mary Rudd, Cabinet Memmber for Community Health said: "I'm no different to any other Waveney resident in wanting to know the safety an cleanliness of the restaurants and other food outlets I use.

I am delighted that Waveney is now part of a consistent National Scheme and I look forward to seeing the new stickers and certificates around the district".

"It also, importantly, gives the public a real opportunity to make informed choices about where to eat or buy food based, not just on price and quality, but also now the safety of the food they're buying," added Cllr Rudd.



ENTERPRISING TIMES

Waveney is gearing up for growth after a bid from the New Anglia Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) for 'Enterprise Zone' status was given the green light by the Government.

The Enterprise Zone will cover six sites in Lowestoft and Great Yarmouth, transforming the two towns, with significant benefits for the rest of Norfolk and Suffolk. It will capitalise on the area's leading position in the energy sector, aiming to create up to 2000 jobs and attract 80 businesses by 2015, and 13,500 jobs and 200 businesses over the 25 year lifetime of the zone.

This is a major incentive to attract new and expanding businesses to the towns and create much needed jobs. Waveney as a Member of the LEP is working closely with the County Council to help regenerate Lowestoft and is working with Norfolk and Great Yarmouth to put the area on the map as an inward investment location.

The Enterprise Zone will benefit from simplified planning rules, a business rate discount for new and expanding businesses and any increase in business rates will be retained by the LEP to support economic development across both counties.

This could generate tens of millions of pounds over the next 25 years and create more than 10,000 additional jobs in the two counties.

The New Anglia Enterprise Zone was one of 11 given the go-ahead out of a total of 29 bids. The submission was ranked as one of the five best submissions.

Andy Wood, chairman of the New Anglia Local Enterprise Partnership, and chief executive of Adnams, said: "I'm delighted that the Government has recognised the quality of our bid and has given our Enterprise Zone the green light. We are confident that the Zone will help create significant numbers of new jobs in Great Yarmouth and Lowestoft and more in the rest of Norfolk and Suffolk."

Colin Law, Leader of Waveney District
Council, said: "I am delighted with the
decision to designate an Enterprise Zone for
Lowestoft and Great Yarmouth, and capitalise
on the area's leading position in the energy
sector. Thousands of jobs will be created,
making a huge difference in terms of
attracting investment, and generating new
business opportunities for both new and
existing local firms.

"What's more this decision benefits the whole of Norfolk and Suffolk through the related supply chains and not just the defined Enterprise Zone areas in both towns, which will see direct rate relief given to new and expanding businesses. This is going to transform Lowestoft and it sends a clear message - exciting opportunities in our area will grow and more jobs will be on offer."



DISABILITY CHAMPION

PUTTING CUSTOMERS FIRST



Waveney District Council is putting considerable thought in to how it supports, assists and responds to its customers and is undertaking a number of activities in the months to come including the launch of a customer survey online.

The Council is revising its 'Customer Service standards' to ensure it continues to meet the standards and level of service that residents and communities can expect when they make contact. It also tells you what the Council expects from you and what to do if things go wrong.

Waveney wants to provide the best service possible and these standards will help deliver a consistent level of service across the Council and across our partnerships.

The standards cover a number of important areas, including the kind of service customers an expect every time they make contact with the council, how they will be treated and how quickly enquiries will be dealt with.

They also look more specifically at what customers can expect when they visit our offices, what they can expect if they telephone the Council and also if they write to us or send us an email.

The standards will also detail the importance of feedback to enable us to keep improving the services we provide. The Council regularly monitors these standards using a variety of

methods to check the quality of service being delivered. These methods include:

- Telephone monitoring
- · Complaint monitoring
- · Feedback from customers

These methods enable the Council to identify areas of good practice, areas for improvement and helps to understand how to deliver an improved services to you, the customer.

However, the standards are only part of the story and the Council is working on a range of projects and considering a range of options on issues such as the future of local offices, the ability to take cash across all sites, opening hours and much more besides.

So with this in mind, a survey has been created for YOU to let us know how you feel about our proposals and the kind of service you would expect from your local Council.

BENEFITS CHANGES

Do you receive Housing Benefit? Are you a Private Tenant? If so, the way your benefit is calculated has changed.

These changes took place from April 2011. This will affect your award straight away if you first claimed benefit after April 2011. However, if you were already receiving benefit the government awarded a nine month protection, which means you may only see changes to your award from January 2012.

If you are aged between 25 and 35 and living alone, further changes were made to your benefit from January 2012. The Government changed the rules that apply to you and you will now be classed as a Young Individual; this means that you will only be entitled to the

lower rate of housing benefit for a room in shared accommodation.

You should have received letters to warn you of these changes and help plan for the rent shortfall you may receive. If the changes leave you with a rent shortfall we may be able to help with a Discretionary Housing Payment. This is a payment that can be used to top up your rent, or council tax, where you are suffering severe financial hardship.

Do you have a "Non Dependant" living in your home with you?

A non dependant is someone who normally lives with you, such as an adult son, daughter, relative or friend. A son or daughter is classed

as an adult when you no longer receive Child Benefit for them.

If you have a non dependant living with you, you may be receiving a deduction from your benefit. This is a deduction to allow for 'keep' we assume the non dependant pays you. If they do not pay you a contribution for their keep, we will still apply the non dependant deduction to your Housing and Council Tax Benefit award. The amount of weekly deduction we take from your benefit will increase from April 2012.
